## INTRODUCTION/PURPOSE:

This item is to request that the Council Discuss and Consider Amendment to City Council and City Staff Committee and Liaison Appointments as follows:

  - One Open Position for Appointment of City Council
- b) Receipt of Staff recommendation for City Staff Representative to the Zero Waste Sonoma SB 1383 Technical Group
- c) Amendment to Committee Appointment for Ad Hoc Committee for Recruitment of City Manager. This item is for Councilmember appointment to the Committee based upon withdrawal of Committee member (Mayor Hinton)

## **BACKGROUND:**

Each year, the City Council makes appointments to the various committees. At the January 17, 2023 City Council Meeting the Council approved the 2023 City Council and City Staff Committee and Liaison appointments. At this meeting two committees were discussed and acted upon as follows:

<u>Climate Action Committee:</u> This item was requested to be returned to the City Council for amendment to the current make up of the Climate Action Committee regarding City Council appointment; and

# Second Action: Zero Waste Sonoma SB 1383 Technical Group Staff Representative Change

Also, for information only, the City Administration has proposed a change to the City Staff representative to the Zero Waste Sonoma SB 1383 Technical Group. It currently is listed as GHD, but City Management is proposing the Staff representatives as follows:

Primary: Planning Director Alternate: Associate Planner

This is a technical group for the ten member jurisdictions working on matters pertaining to the implementation of SB 1383. As Zero Waste Subcommittee falls within the Climate Action Committee, the responsible Department for Climate Action would be the best staff representative.

Third Action: Ad Hoc Committee for Recruitment Options for Current Position of City Manager/City Attorney
At the January 17, 2023, the City Council discussed and approved the creation of an Ad Hoc Committee to explore
all options for the recruitment of the current City Manager/City Attorney position. At this meeting, the City
Council appointed Mayor Hinton and Councilmember McLewis to serve as members of this Ad Hoc Committee.

Mayor Hinton has requested to withdraw her name as a Committee member to this committee and that another Councilmember be appointed to this Ad Hoc Committee.

Tonight's item is for selection of a new Ad Hoc Committee member to the Ad Hoc Committee for Recruitment for City Manager/City Attorney Position to fill the vacancy created by the withdrawal of Mayor Hinton to this committee. This committee will be reviewing all recruitment options for the current position. All options will be returned to a future City Council Meeting for discussion and direction to staff.

### **ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW**
