#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

HomeFirst will provide a presentation on Sonoma County's Coordinated Entry System, which streamlines access to housing solutions for individuals, youth and families experiencing homelessness. No Council action is required.

#### **BACKGROUND**

In 1980, a group of service providers and advocates identified a gap in homeless services. With eight families in crisis and no safe place to go, these advocates created an agency to meet the needs of unhoused families in Santa Clara County.

Since that time, HomeFirst has expanded significantly. In FY 2024-25, HomeFirst impacted almost 10,000 individuals across Santa Clara and Sonoma Counties, including youth, seniors, and veterans. Approximately 5,600 people received direct supportive services, and more than 4,000 benefited from HomeFirst's systems leadership.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The item tonight is a presentation from HomeFirst on Coordinated Entry.

Coordinated Entry is a streamlined system designed to:

- Assess the needs and strengths of individuals experiencing homelessness.
- Connect them to appropriate housing solutions.
- Prioritize resources for those most in need.
- Collect data that allows communities to strategically align resources and close service gaps.

Sonoma County's Coordinated Entry system follows a Housing First model, prioritizing individuals, families, and transitionaged youth with the highest vulnerability and need for permanent supportive housing. It is important to note that Coordinated Entry is not an emergency response system; those in crisis are directed to contact local emergency shelter programs. 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In April 2022, HomeFirst assumed management of the Sonoma County Coordinated Entry System, building on the strong foundation previously established by Catholic Charities. HomeFirst's Vice President for Sonoma County, Hunter Scott, and Director of Coordinated Entry, Kaitlin Johnson-Carney, will serve as presenters for this agenda item. A Sonoma County native, Hunter Scott has worked in Coordinated Entry systems in multiple regions of the country. Kaitlin Johnon-Carney first began working with Sonoma County Coordinated Entry at previous employer Catholic Charities in 2017 and has led the system since 2020.

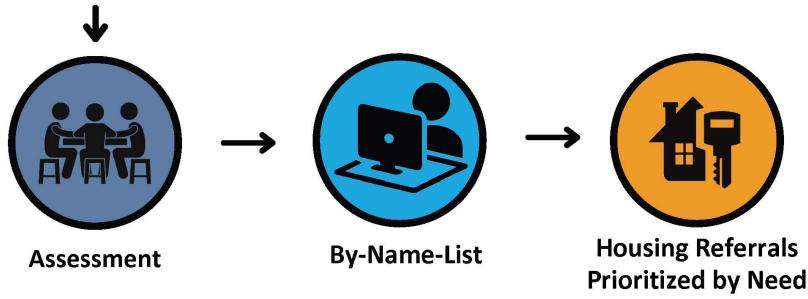

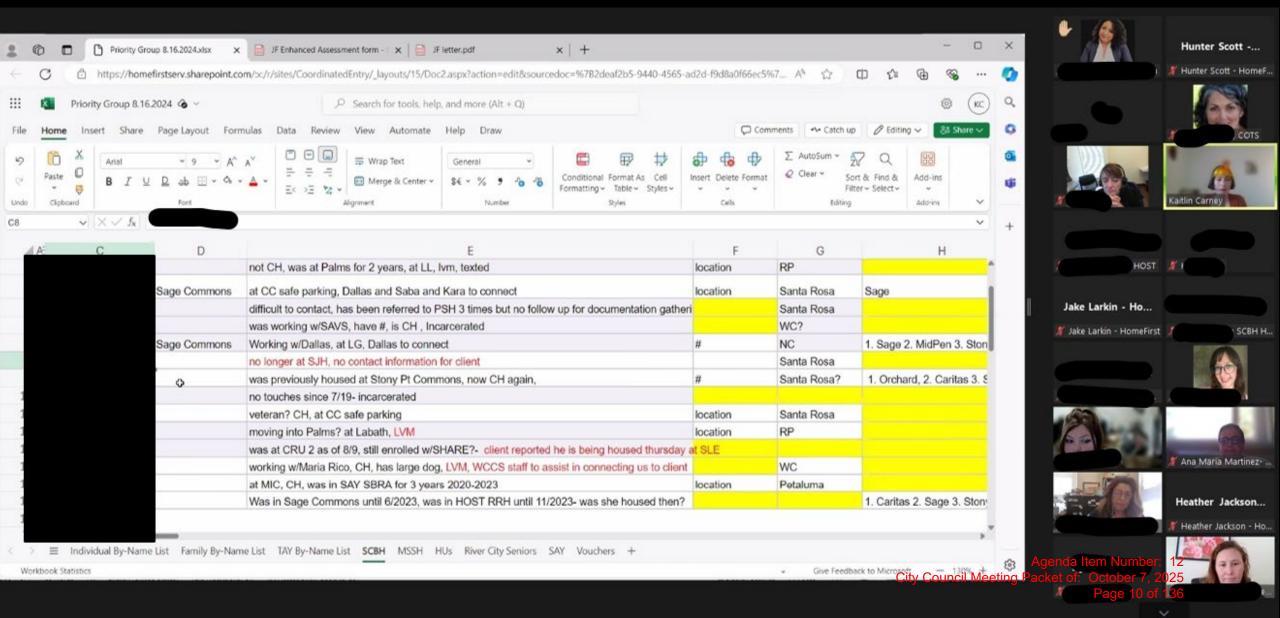

# Eligibility vs Prioritization

Eligibility- The criteria that individual housing projects set to screen in prioritized households. CES does not set eligibility criteria.

Prioritization- The order that households are ranked in, which is used to match people with housing interventions. Prioritization is determined using assessments conducted by CES Access Points.

# Eligibility

Each housing provider has their own list of eligibility criteria based on:

- Chronic Homelessness requirement- required eligibility for PSH, which is the highest level of housing intervention within the system. This requirement is set by HUD.
- Property management criteria- background check status, income limits
- Funding stream contract criteria- some funding sources have their own eligibility criteria. Local funding could, for example, requires all referred matches to be high emergency service utilizers or enrolled in Sonoma County Behavioral Health services.



# Prioritization

Ranks households based on urgency and vulnerability to allocate housing resources

Current Coordinated Entry Vulnerability Factors:

- Length of time homeless
- Increased risk of death/ severe health conditions
- Increased risk of victimization
- Institutional utilization



# Housing Match Referrals

At CES Case Conference the proposed referral is reviewed ander: 12 confirmed based on prioritization and known eligibility.

Providers present at meeting, including clinicians, help assign staff for eligibility coordination.

Prospective referral rejections are reviewed for approval.

CE staff send referral to housing provider in HMIS.

CE staff send referral connection email, connecting all assigned staff with housing provider.

Housing providers contact assigned staff and participant with referral, to offer opportunity and collect remaining eligibility documentation.

If participant with referral is found ineligible or there is a challenge with referral - housing provider brings this to Case Conference to problem-solve.

If participant is found eligible, referral is in HMIS and hart Agenda Item Number: 12 in.

# Gravenstein Commons

### 3-6 months before lease-up:

- CES assists housing provider to complete Housing Checklist steps
- SVDP sends eligibility criteria and details regarding units being filled
- CES creates Housing Packet entry
- CES contacted to start identifying potential housing match referrals

### 1-3 months before lease-up:

- CES collects preference and contact information for each identified referral
- CES identifies staff assigned to coordinate each household matched to collect documents
- CES begins sending housing match referrals
- CES assists with problem solving referrals not working out
- CES replaces ineligible referrals



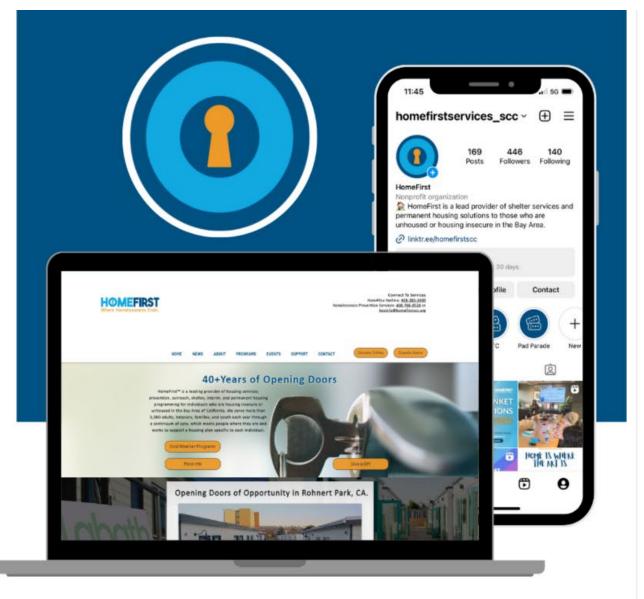

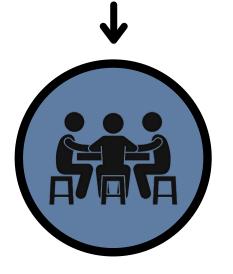

# Participant FAQs about the Sonoma County Coordinated Entry System

#### 1. What is a Coordinated Entry System (CES)?

- Coordinated Entry matches people experiencing homelessness to available housing programs. It prioritizes those who are most in need of assistance.
- Referrals are made only to permanent housing, not shelters.

#### 2. What is a CES Assessment?

- Used to determine eligibility for referrals to homeless permanent housing services.
- Places you on a centralized By-Names-List so you don't have to apply program by program.
- Includes to the Vulnerability Index Survey (VI-SPDAT), a standard assessment tool used to measure a person's vulnerability and housing needs.
- Matches you with housing services that meet your needs when they are available, although an assessment does not guarantee a referral.

# 3. What is the Sonoma County Coordinated Entry System By-Name-List?

- The By-Name-List is a list of individuals, families, and transitional age youth who are experiencing homelessness prioritized by vulnerability.
- The By-Name-List is a dynamic waiting list and does not guarantee referrals to any particular service or program.
- The most vulnerable, eligible, and most in need will be connected to available housing programs first.
- If you do not accept the housing referral offered to you, you will maintain your placement on the By-Name-List and will be offered the next eligible referral.
- The By-Name-List is stored in the Homeless Management Information System, which is not accessible to the public.

#### 4. I've completed the CES Assessment. What should I do now?

- Keep your contact and location information up to date with an Access Point
- Stay in contact with a CES Access Point, shelter, or outreach team every 90 days to maintain your active status on the By-Name-List and eligibility for housing referrals.
- Update your CES Assessment annually or when a major life event occurs.
- Continue to pursue other housing options, services, and benefits.
   Many people who are on the list will NOT be offered a housing opportunity or will wait a very long time for a referral. This is currently due to the lack of housing opportunities.

#### 5. What are my rights as a participant in Sonoma County CES?

- The CES, Access Points and Cooperating Agencies must comply with the nondiscrimination provisions of federal civil rights laws, which bar discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, actual or perceived sexual orientation or gender identity, disability, familial status, marital status, citizenship (or lack thereof).
- Depending on eligibility, cooperating agencies may refer a participant to a more appropriate agency.
- You have the option for your information to be stored on the By-Names-List anonymously, and it can be removed at any time.
- You can register for the Coordinated Entry System regardless of your legal status. Access points and Cooperating Agencies have assistance in Spanish.

#### 6. How do I submit a complaint or grievance?

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#### **Immigration and CES FAQ**

#### Can someone who is undocumented enroll in Coordinated Entry?

 Yes, anyone who is undocumented can be enrolled in Coordinated Entry. Immigration status is not a barrier to enrollment.

#### Can someone who is undocumented be housed at any **Coordinated Entry referred housing program?**

• While some programs do not take documentation status into account, there are some projects that require a person to be documented. A person's documentation status will not be used as a barrier for any referrals made through Coordinated Entry.

#### If I receive a housing referral through Coordinated Entry, what kind of documents do I need to give to the housing providers to move forward in the housing process?

• The type of documentation that needs to be given to housing providers can vary from project to project. Typically, you will need to provide some form of identification and income verification.

#### What do you do with a person's information once collected?

• Information is entered into the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) which cannot be accessed by the public. We do not share your information with anyone outside of the cooperating agencies listed on the Release of Information.

#### Can I enroll in Coordinated Entry without using my name and identifying information?

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• Yes, you can be enrolled anonymously. If you are more comfortable not having your identifying information entered into HMIS, you can ask to be enrolled as an anonymous participant. You are still eligible to receive housing referrals through Coordinated Entry. Any identifying information will be stored safely outside of HMIS by the Access Point that enrolled you into the system. You can always enroll using your name and identifying information and decide later that you want to be anonymous, and vice versa.

#### How long is the Release of Information that I signed valid?

• The Release of Information is valid for 3 years unless you state an expiration date prior to the 3 years. Once your ROI expires you will be dismissed from the system. You can sign another ROI at that point to continue your enrollment in the system.

#### I no longer want to be enrolled in Coordinated Entry. What do I do?

• You can ask to be dismissed from Coordinated Entry at any time. Any Access Point can be notified of the request and help facilitate this with the Coordinated Entry staff.

#### 7. Shelter Utilization Dashboard (00:13:20 - 00:50:40)

Daniel Overbury-Howland, Homeless Management Information Systems (HMIS)
Coordinator, described the HMIS data reporting process, which doesn't allow for
reporting shelter capacity and utilization in real-time. Currently, service providers are
allotted up to five (5) days to enter events into HMIS, creating a lag of up to five (5) days
for client admissions and exits to be reflected in the system. After discussion of possible,
remedies to allow for real-time analysis, the subsequent determination was that the lag
did not represent a significant drawback in overall reporting at this time.

Slides were shown illustrating the current capabilities and categories for presenting utilization data. This content can be provided to the HC Board monthly or quarterly on a

regular basis. The data can also be built into an interactive dashboard accessible on the Sonoma County Homeless Coalition website.

The recommended action, as outlined in the agenda item summary, is for the Board to direct staff to create a shelter utilization dashboard for the website. After discussion, the query before the HC Board was to instead identify the manner in which they would like HMIS data to be presented.

The consensus was that a monthly shelter utilization data report to the HC Board would be sufficient and could be presented in the form of a URL link within the monthly meeting packet. The report would not necessarily be presented for discussion at each meeting but would be available on a monthly basis for each board member's situational awareness. Intermittent refinements of data points, such as subpopulations, may be provided as future conversations develop and needs arise.

#### 11. Word from the LEAP Board (01:05:47 – 01:12:13)

• Chessie Etheredge reported that circumstances on the street are becoming increasing difficult due to the presence of Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents. Fear and distrust are widespread throughout the unsheltered community, creating obstacles to locating people. Chair Holmes suggests this might be an ongoing topic of conversation and invites input from the Lived Experience Advisory Panel (LEAP) Board for any ideas to help minimize these impacts to the unsheltered community.

#### 12. Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Updates and Amendment (01:12:15 – 01:21:59

• Michael Gause and Chuck Mottern explained that the ESG is a State of California grant of about \$200,000, which is usually rolled into the annual Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA). This year, however, the funds came off-cycle and were not awarded until after the NOFA process concluded. Subsequently, small amounts from this funding were added to all eligible Emergency Shelter (60% of funds) and Rapid Rehousing (RRH, 40% of funds) projects who were awarded allocations in the 2025-26 NOFA. All of the funding in these project budgets will be held to ESG standards. All but one of the eligible recipients have accepted the additional funds. The funding amendments are expected to be completed by October – November 2025.

The staff recommended action is to approve this approach to amend Emergency Shelter and RRH contract budgets with ESG funds.

Providers with conflicts of interest were recused pending action being taken: Jennielynn Holmes, Chris Cabral, Dannielle Danforth, Margaret Sluyk. A quorum remained.

Vice-Chair McDonnell facilitated the ensuing proceedings while Chair Holmes was recused.

#### **SUMMARY:**

Informational Update: Lead Agency Evaluation Ad Hoc Committee

As recommended by the Governance Charter Ad Hoc Committee, the Homeless Coalition Board approved an evaluation tool in April 2025 to assess the performance of the Lead Agency/Collaborative Applicant for the Continuum of Care. Although the tool was adopted, no start date was initially set.

In December 2024, the Board tasked the Governance Charter Ad Hoc Committee with creating an evaluation plan. The process includes:

- **Tool**: A checklist based on a previously available HUD resource.
- **Frequency**: Every two years.
- Process: Led by a Board-appointed ad hoc committee.
- Accountability: Committee may develop an action plan if needed.
- Authority: Final decisions rest with the HC Board.

On June 25, 2025, the Board approved forming a new ad hoc committee (up to 7 members) to carry out the evaluation over a six-month period. The committee will report monthly to the Board and hold two public meetings.

#### **Background:**

The Governance Charter currently establishes the following committee membership structures:

- Coordinated Entry Advisory Committee (CEAC): 13–15 members.
- HMIS Data Committee: 13 members.

#### **Committee Challenges:**

- Coordinated Entry Advisory Committee: The large membership requirement has led to frequent quorum issues. For example, the most recent Coordinated Entry operator evaluation was delayed by two months because quorum could not be achieved leading to cancelled meetings.
- **HMIS Data Committee:** Maintaining a full roster of 13 members has been difficult. In addition, this committee does require some specialized skillsets such as analytical, data, and systems thinking. The committee currently has 10 members. While a new member was accepted by reviewing applications from the March 2025 application cycle, recruitment outside the annual nomination period is limited by the Charter, which only allows:
  - 1. Selection through the annual application cycle,
  - 2. Replacement recommendations from the committee, or
  - 3. Appointment by the Board Chair and Vice Chair.

#### **Recommendation:**

After consultation with Board Chair and Vice Chair, it has been recommended that the Board consider a Governance Charter change to address these issues by:

- **Option A:** Adjusting committee quorum requirements (to improve functionality of large committees).
- **Option B:** Reducing the required number of members for certain committees to better align with available capacity and skillsets.

#### **Action Requested:**

Board direction on whether to move forward with a Governance Charter amendment to implement one or more of the options outlined above.

#### **SUMMARY:**

#### RECOMMENDED ACTION(S):

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The Point in Time (PIT) Count is a count of unsheltered and sheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night in January. In 2025, under the coordination of Applied Survey Research (the Department's contracted consultant supplying homeless count services) and County Department of Health Services staff, the Sonoma County PIT Count took place on Friday, January 31, 2025. On that one night it counted the number of people sheltered in emergency shelters, transitional housing, and Safe Havens as well as the number of unsheltered people experiencing homelessness,

In 2025, 1,952 individuals were counted, a decrease of 23% from 2,522 individuals in 2024. More information on possible causes of the decrease and other information on demographics is included below. 1,123 individuals were living in unsheltered circumstances (a decrease of 29% from 2024) and 829 were in sheltered circumstances (a decrease of 12% from 2024).

As Lead Agency to the Sonoma County CoC, DHS conducts the annual PIT Count to track progress towards ending homelessness in Sonoma County. HUD requires a local PIT Count of any CoC to enable participating agencies to access HUD's CoC funding. In 2024, HUD CoC funding for Sonoma County totaled approximately \$4.7 million. Some State agencies use PIT Count data to formulate funding allocations. Further, when combined with data from the Department's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), the count informs the County's homeless housing needs.

The 2025 PIT count suggests decreases potentially as a result of:

- The addition of 402 new permanent beds in 2024 (including permanent supportive housing, rapid rehousing, and permanent housing).
- Continued coordination between the County, nine cities, and the Homeless Coalition
  on funding strategies and implementation of the Strategic Plan.

- Coordination with regional partners on the "By Names List." A By Names List is kept in each region of the County and updated continuously with the names of individuals known to be experiencing homelessness in the region. On the day of the Count, 1,813 individuals were counted on the By Names List, a very similar number to the overall Count.

Each year, following the PIT Count, surveys are conducted with individuals and families experiencing homelessness (both sheltered and unsheltered). This is done to gain insight on demographics and experience of single adults, families, and transition-age youth experiencing homelessness. These surveys, over 300 in total, were conducted representing a confidence interval of +/- 4% with a 95% confidence level when generalizing the results of the survey to the estimated population of individuals experiencing homelessness. Surveys were conducted in a peer-to-peer fashion in the two weeks after the PIT Count and include key information on homeless subpopulations.

Subpopulations of individuals experiencing homelessness include individuals experiencing chronic homelessness (defined generally as an individual with at least one year of continuous homelessness and a disability), transition age youth ages 18-24, homeless families with children, and veterans. Within these subpopulations:

• The number of individuals experiencing "chronic homelessness," those who have been homeless for at least 12 months or on at least four separate occasions in the previous three years and who have one or more disabling conditions, rose from 606 to 730 (20%) over 2024. There is not enough specific data to verify the reason for this increase.

- The number of homeless veterans dropped considerably from 162 to 99 (-39%).
- More families (identified as having at least one adult over 18 with at least one child under 18) are experiencing homelessness, having risen from 57 to 78 (37%). Almost all families were found to be in sheltered settings in 2025.
   Shelter providers have noted that there has been an increase in families from immigrant communities.
- The number of homeless youth dropped from 151 to 115 (-24%) in 2025. The number of homeless youth consisted of 10 unaccompanied children (persons under the age of 18 without parents) and 105 transition-age youth ages 18-24. This reduction occurred despite the early 2024 closure of Social Advocates for Youth, terminating their homeless youth program. In 2024, the number of youth experiencing homelessness dropped 50% from 2023 numbers.
- 89% of individuals reported they became homeless while living in Sonoma County.

Next year's Count will take place on Friday January 30<sup>th</sup>, 2026. Planning and preparation will begin in October of 2025 and will follow a similar approach as this year.

#### Agenda Item Overview

In late 2023, the Homeless Coalition board approved a working group to begin redesigning the assessment and prioritization elements of Coordinated Entry (CE). Over the course of almost 2 years this working group developed a new assessment and prioritization system. The group analyzed data from past assessments to determine who was the most vulnerable and least likely to get out of homelessness without an intervention from the system of care. This process was done with an equity lens to attempt to address the inequities in the system of care. Later the working group developed a new assessment tool to replace the VI-SPDAT. This tool is much shorter than the previous assessment and is more trauma informed. It is also universal to all populations which means people will not need to be reassessed if their familial situation changes.

In May 2025, the Sonoma County Homeless Coalition board approved a proposal to redesign the assessment tool and prioritization process for CE. Since then, the lead agency and HomeFirst have been working to implement the new tool and assessment process. This work has involved conducting numerous trainings so that access points are trained on the new tool. Additionally, there have been several information sessions for different stakeholder groups on the changes to CE and there has been some backend Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) work that has been done to implement the new process. If approved, the new assessment tool and prioritization process can be implemented immediately. Over 80% of the assessors in the community have been trained and additional trainings continue.

Staff is presenting changes to the CE policies and procedures to implement the new prioritization process. The changes to the policies and procedures are listed below. They mostly relate to prioritization policies and procedures. Other minor changes are included in this proposal.

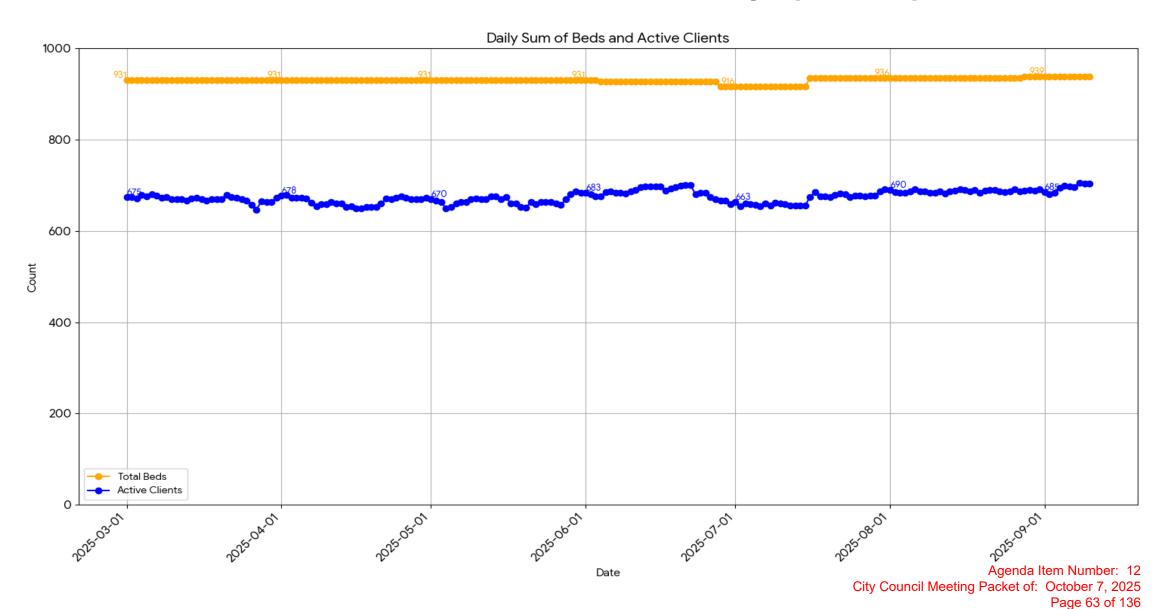

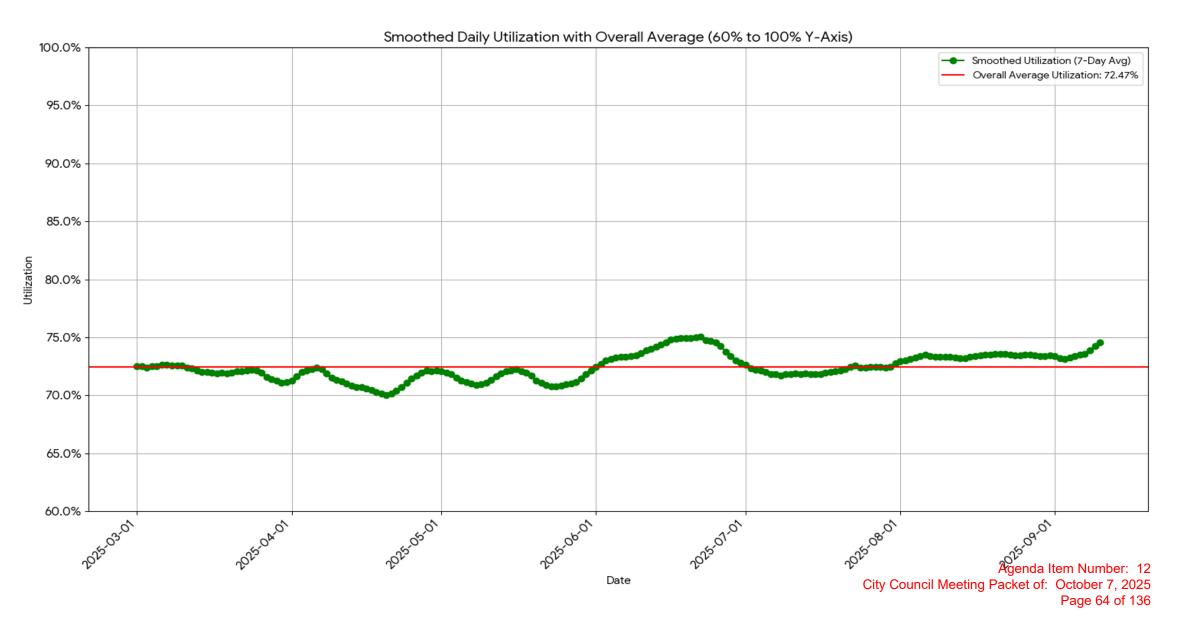

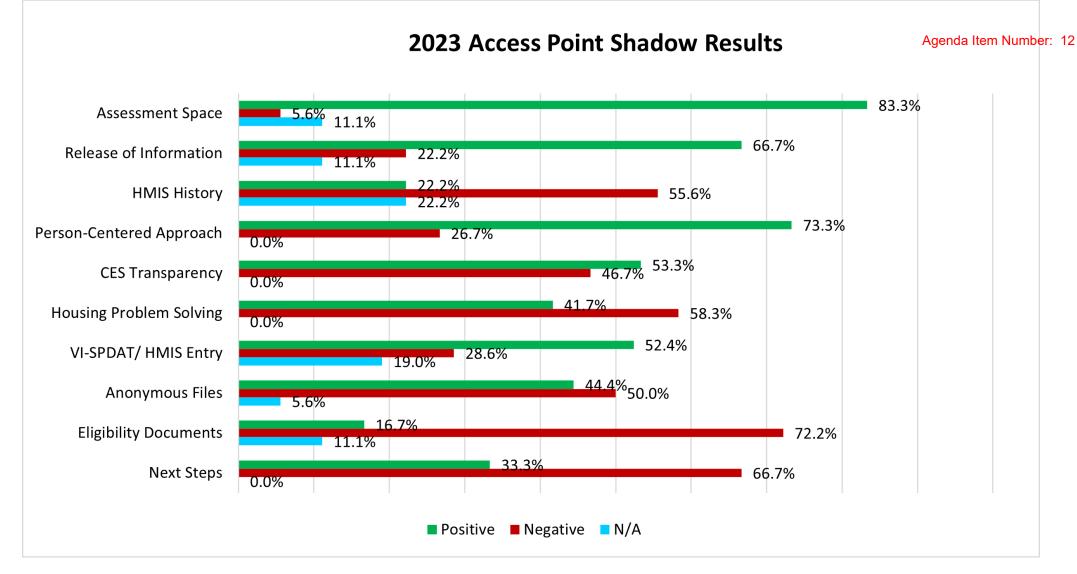










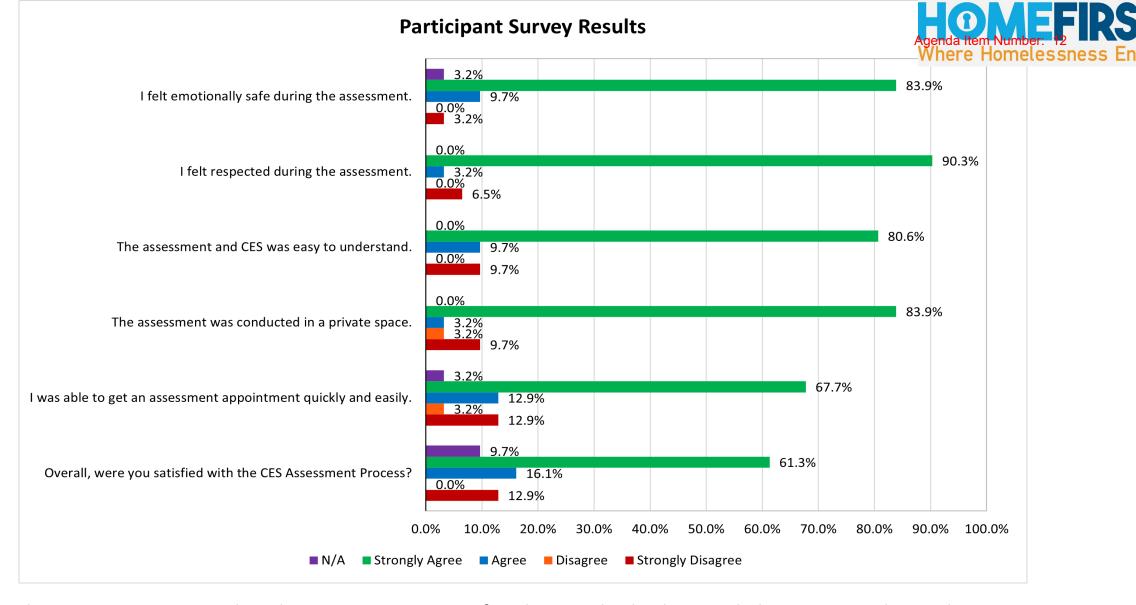


In May of 2023 CES staff shadowed 8 major Access Points in Sonoma County that completed over 50 enrollments in a year. From the data collected the areas that these Access Points need to improve are HMIS History, Housing Problem Solving, Anonymous Files, Eligibility Documents and Next steps. It is important to also point out that these Access Points are overall trauma focused and person-centered which is vital in ensuring that clients are being assessed accurately and respectfully. One last note, it is concerning that Transparency around the system is about 50/50. One of our main visions for CES in Sonoma County is Agenda Item Number: 12

Transparency not only with our external partners but also with the community.

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The CE Operator completed Participant Surveys for clients who had recently been entered into the system in November and December 23. 31 Participants completed the Survey. Overall satisfaction with the CES assessment is 61%. Assessors continue being trauma informed and person centered over a become 12 which is a vital component to the system, though access does appear to be an issue.

### **PARTICIPANT ACTIVITY**

For a participant to remain active in CE, a provider in the system must have contact with them every 90 days, at minimum. Contact with the system can take the form of a CE case note, HUD project start, or HUD project exit. Every two weeks, emails are sent by HomeFirst to the providers that have had the last recorded contact with participants who are soon to become inactive. These emails let providers know that a case note is needed to avoid an inactivity status.

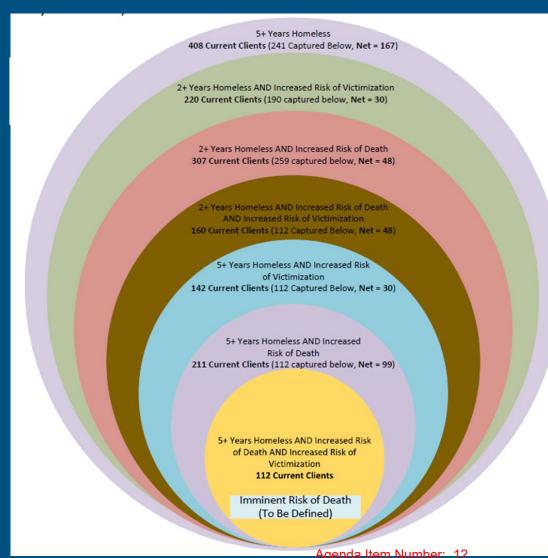

## CE Participants prioritized for housing referrals 7/1/2024-6/30/2025



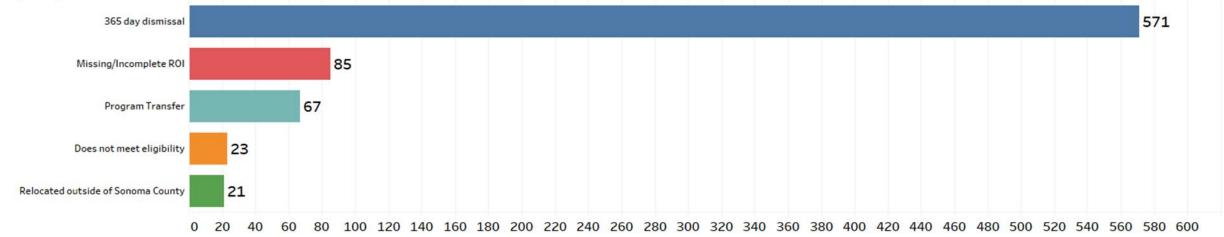




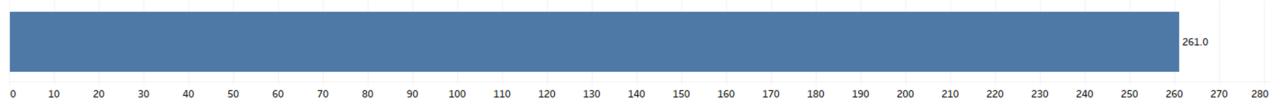

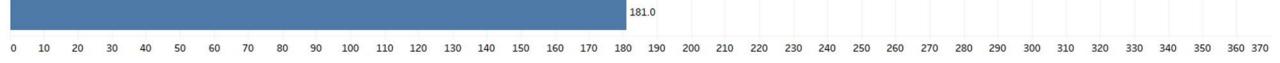
Median Number of Days between Assessment and Referral By Program 7/1/2024 - 6/30/2025



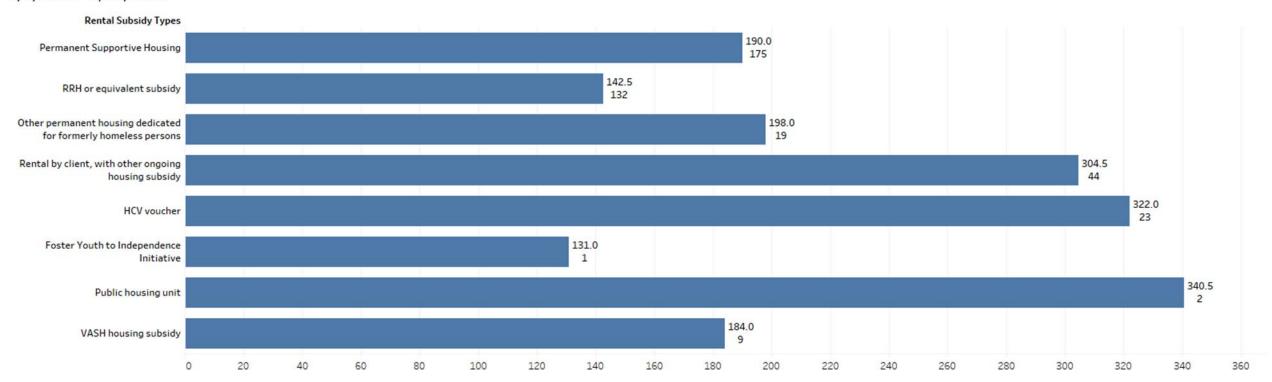

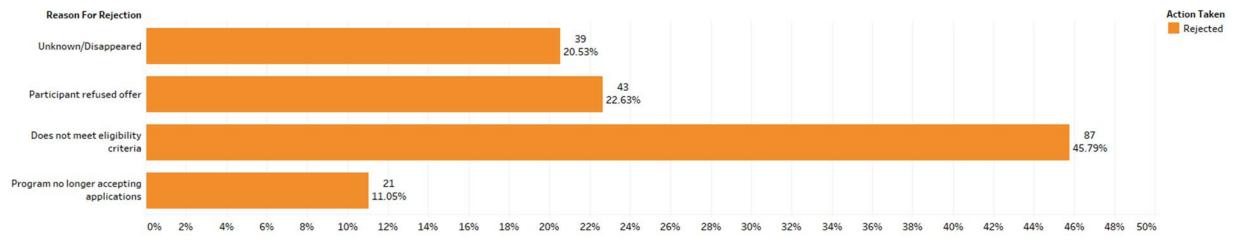




### Median Number of Days from Assessment to Permanent Housing With Ongoing Subsidy 7/1/2024 - 6/30/2025



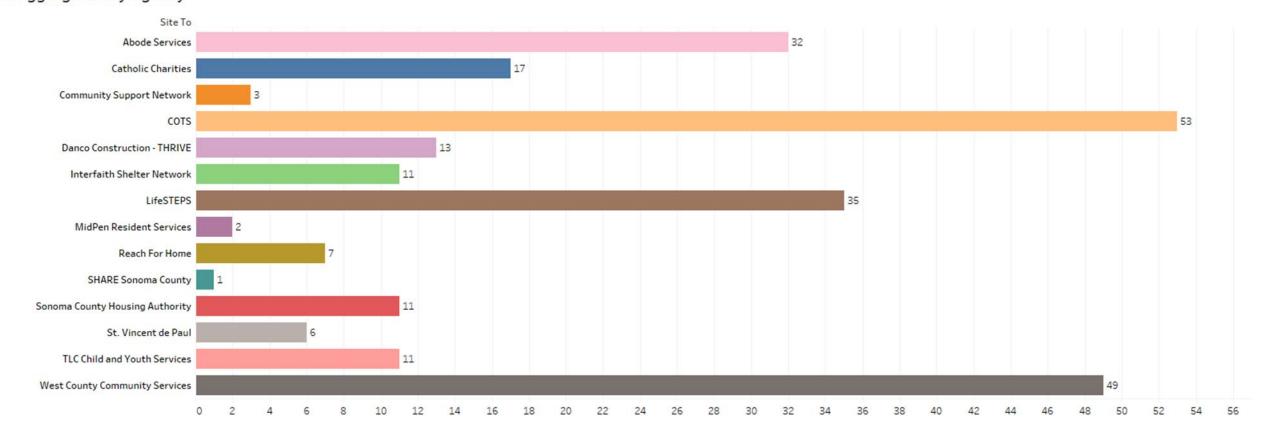
### Rejected Referrals - Reasons 7/1/2024 - 6/30/2025

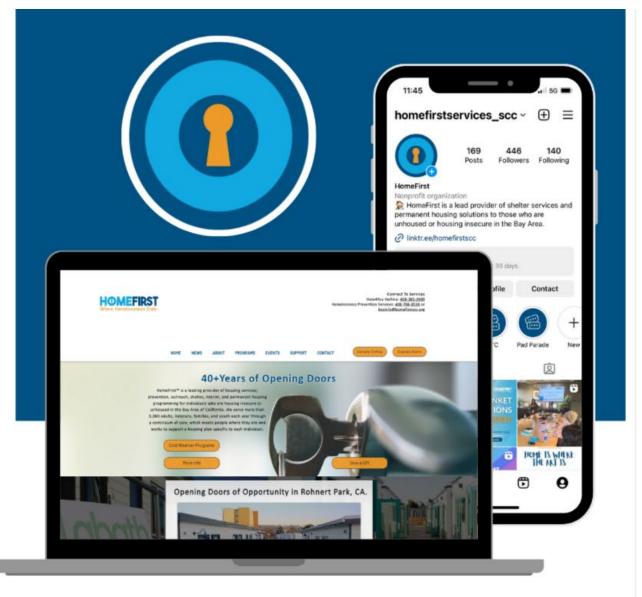

# **Enhanced Prioritization and Assessment and Transfers**

- Progressive engagement transfers (low to high) and mitigations (high to low) have updated forms to align with the new prioritization factors. These types of enhanced assessments now require less rigorous requirements.
- The process for Emergency transfers will remain the same.
