ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU. THE NEXT THING WE'RE GOING TO DO IS ABSOLUTE TO THE FLAG, IF WE COULD ALL STAND AND DO THAT. I PLEDGE ALLEGIANCE TO THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AND TO THE REPUBLIC FOR WHICH IT STANDS ONE NATION UNDER GOD INDIVISIBLE WITH LIBERTY AND JUSTICE FOR ALL.

I JUST WANTED TO STATE. ONE THING I DISCOVERED LEADING THE MEETING THROUGH ZOOM. UNLESS SOMEONE IS ON THE MICROPHONE, YOU ABSOLUTELY CANNOT HEAR ANYTHING ON THE ROOM. SO IF ANYTHING IS HAPPENING IN THE ROOM, I JUST HOPE THAT SOMEONE WILL COMMUNICATE THAT WITH ME BECAUSE IT'S BEEN A LEARNING PROCESS OVER THIS YEAR. I CAN SEE SOME CHAIRS, BUT OTHER THAN THAT, I CAN'T HEAR ANYTHING OTHER THAN WHAT'S ON THE MICROPHONES. OKAY. SO WE HAVE THE LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT THAT WE DO AT EVERY MEETING. THE CITY OF SEBASTOPOL ACKNOWLEDGES THAT WE LIVE AND WORK WITHIN THE UNCEDED ANCESTRAL HOMELANDS OF THE SOUTHERN POMO AND THE COAST MIWOK PEOPLE. WE PAY OUR RESPECT TO THE PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE GENERATIONS OF THESE PEOPLES, INCLUDING THE FED RATED INDIANS OF GRATON RANCHERIA. AND THIS EVENING, JUST DUE TO ALL OF THE -- JUST DUE TO THE CHANGES MADE IT IN DOING THIS REMOTE, WE WON'T BE DOING THE HISTORY PIECE TONIGHT, BUT I'LL HAVE THAT BACK AT OUR NEXT MEETING. WE DO NOT HAVE ANY PROCLAMATIONS OR PRESENTATIONS THIS EVENING. SO THE FIRST THING I WANT TO ASK EVERYONE IS IF THERE ARE ANY STATEMENTS OF

CONFLICT OF INTEREST? I SEE HEADS SHAKING. COUNCILMEMBER CARTER, I CAN'T TELL IF YOU --

WE HAVE NO STATEMENTS IN THE CHAMBERS.

OKAY, THANK YOU. I APPRECIATE EVERYONE SHAKING THEIR HEADS, WHILE IT'S HARD TO SEE. OKAY. SO WE'RE GOING TO MOVE ON TO PUBLIC COMMENTS FOR ITEMS NOT ON THE AGENDA. SO IF YOU WANT TO GO AHEAD AND TAKE THAT OVER, MARY?

THANK YOU, MAYOR. SO AS STATED, THIS IS FOR ITEMS NOT ON TONIGHT'S AGENDA. IT IS A 20-MINUTE TIME LIMIT. IT IS A TWO-MINUTE PER SPEAKER. WE GO TO CHAMBERS FIRST, AND THEN GO OUT TO ZOOM, COME BACK IN, GO BACK OUT UNTIL THERE'S TEN SPEAKERS. I'LL ELECT THE CHAMBERS IF THERE IS ANYONE IN CHAMBERS THAT WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT FOR ITEMS NOT ON THE AGENDA?

IS THE MICROPHONE PUSHED ON?

HELLO, MAYOR AND COUNCILMEMBERS, MY NAME IS MELISSA PAIGE. I'M A MEMBER OF TENANTS UNITED, AND WE ARE JUST HERE TO ASK YOU TO PUT THE PERMANENT, THE ORDINANCE ON THE AGENDA TO MAKE IT PERMANENT. THANK YOU.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT, I'LL GO OUT TO ZOOM. KYLE, CAN YOU UNMUTE YOURSELF, PLEASE?

I CAN.

THANK YOU. CAN YOU SEE THE TIMER?

I CAN'T, BUT YOU CAN LET ME KNOW.

GREAT. GO AHEAD, PLEASE.

GOOD EVENING. I WANT TO BEGIN TONIGHT BY CORRECTING SOMETHING I SAID DURING PUBLIC COMMENT AT THE AUGUST MEETING, AND APOLOGIZE TO COUNCILMEMBER HINTON. I SAID IN THAT MEETING THAT COUNCILMEMBER HINTON HAD MISSED FOUR OUT OF THE PREVIOUS FIVE SCTCA MEETING. WHILE I WAS MAKING THAT COMMENT, COUNCILMEMBER HINTON ACTUALLY ARRIVED LATE TO THE MEETING. SO I MISSPOKE AND I APOLOGIZE. YOU HAVE ONLY MISSED THREE OF THE PREVIOUS FIVE MEETINGS WITHOUT AN ALTERNATE PRESENT, NOT FOUR. BUT THERE'S AN IMPORTANT ITEM LATER IN THAT MEETING THAT NEYSA DID MISS AFTER LEAVING SOMEWHAT EARLY TO ATTEND A SONOMA COUNTY FAIR MEETING. I WANT TO MAKE SURE COUNCIL HEARS ABOUT IT. SCTCA REPORTED SEBASTOPOL WAS THE ONLY JURISDICTION IN SONOMA COUNTY INITIALLY FOUND OUT OF COMPLIANCE WITH MAINTENANCE EFFORT REQUIREMENT. THE PURPOSE OF THAT REQUIREMENT IS SIMPLE. WHEN VOTERS PROPOSE NEW TRANSPORTATION FUNDING, CITIES AREN'T SUPPOSE TO RESPOND BY REDUCING THEIR OWN BASELINE TRANSPORTATION SPENDING. SCTCA CALLS THIS A KEY ACCOUNTABILITY PROMISE MADE TO VOTERS. SEBASTOPOL IS INITIALLY 8% DEFICIT. STAFF RECOMMENDED WITHHOLDING AND REDISTRIBUTING MORE THAN \$11,000 OF FUNDING, AND THE CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE SUPPORTED THAT RECOMMENDATION. BEFORE THE SCTCA BOARD COULD TAKE THAT FINAL ACT, SEBASTOPOL REVISED ITS FINANCIAL REPORTING FOLLOWING AN AUDIT, AND REVISED REPORTING TO THE STATE CONTROLLER. WE WERE ULTIMATELY DECLARED COMPLIANT. MAYBE THESE REVISIONS WERE ENTIRELY APPROPRIATE. BUT THAT'S EXACTLY WHY I THINK THIS DESERVES A PUBLIC EXPLANATION HERE.

KYLE, YOU HAVE ABOUT 30 SECONDS.

HOW DOES SEBASTOPOL'S FINANCIAL PRACTICES ALLOW US TO REPORT OURSELVES OUT OF COMPLIANCE IN THE FIRST PLACE? WHAT SPECIFICALLY CHANGED AFTER WE WERE THREATENED WITH LOSING FUNDING? AND WHY DID OUR REPRESENTATIVE TO SCTCA NOT REPORT THE SITUATION BACK TO THE COUNCIL AND THE PUBLIC WHEN IT WAS UNFOLDING?

THANK YOU, KYLE FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT, I'LL COME INTO CHAMBERS IF THERE IS ANYONE IN CHAMBERS? I'LL GET THE GENTLEMAN THE NEXT TIME.

HELLO, MY NAME IS SANDY RUSSELL. AM I LOUD ENOUGH? CAN YOU HEAR?

WE CAN HEAR.

GREAT. OKAY. I JUST CAME TONIGHT BECAUSE WE'VE BEEN WORKING WITH YOU FOR THE LAST YEAR ON THE ORDINANCE TO HELP PROTECT US FROM EVICTION FROM WOODMARK. ANY WAY TONIGHT'S COMMENTS FROM ME ARE BASICALLY TO THANK EVERYBODY FOR YOUR TIME AND YOUR CONSIDERATION IN MAKING THIS HAPPEN FOR US. WE REALLY, REALLY APPRECIATE IT. I WANT TO WISH YOU ALL GOOD LUCK ON YOUR

RE-ELECTION. I KNOW IT'S ALL COMING UP, AND I THINK, YES, YOU'RE THE VICE MAYOR NOW. YEAH. WELL, THANK YOU. THANK YOU TO COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN. HE HELPED US A LOT WITH OUR PLIGHT IN LIVING AT WOODMARK AND FIGHTING EVICTIONS, AND WE'RE VERY SAD TO SEE YOU GO. THANK YOU FOR EVERYTHING YOU DID FOR US AND MARY TOO, AND ALEX. THANK YOU. OKAY. I HOPE OWE ALL GOT A COPY OF OUR STATEMENT REGARDING THE ORDINANCE, AND WE ARE REALLY ANXIOUS TO BRING IT FORWARD RATHER THAN LEAVE IT TILL LATER BECAUSE WE KNOW THIS IS GOING TO BE A CHANGING OF THE GUARD, AND WE REALLY WANT TO TRY TO MAKE IT A PERMANENT PART OF OUR EXISTENCE TO PROTECT US FROM FURTHER EVICTION PROBLEMS. THE THREE FACTS THAT YOU MIGHT BE INTERESTED IN. THREE COMPONENTS AS TO WHY WE'RE STILL HERE, AND PEOPLE ARE PRETTY AMAZED ABOUT THAT, THAT WE ARE STILL HERE AFTER FIGHTING FOR A YEAR.

YOU HAVE 20 SECONDS.

OKAY. THE ORDINANCE, WHICH WAS A BIG DETERRENT IN THEIR FINAL FLIGHT TO EVICT US. SONOMA COUNTY WAS ABSOLUTELY AMAZING THAT PRODUCED SOME FANTASTIC DISCOVERY DOCUMENTS THAT WAS NOT ONLY ASTOUNDING, BUT SHOCKING TO ALL OF US AND WHAT HAS HAPPENED IN THE BACKGROUND.

SANDY, THAT'S TWO MINUTES.

WE JUST BASICALLY REALLY APPRECIATE EVERYBODY'S HELP. THANK YOU.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT I'LL OUT TO ZOOM. MARY, CAN YOU UNMUTE YOURSELF, PLEASE?

OH, YES.

THANK YOU, CAN YOU SEE THE TIMER?

I CAN.

OKAY, GO AHEAD, PLEASE.

OKAY, THANK YOU. YES, MY NAME IS MARY MEIHAUS. I'M A MEMBER OF THE EFOC FINANCE COMMITTEE. I'M JUST HERE TO TALK ABOUT THE EFOC AND WHAT OUR THOUGHTS ARE AS THE FINANCE COMMITTEE. I WOULD WANT TO FIRST STRESS THE IMPORTANCE OF THE CITY REPAYING THE \$5.5 MILLION, IDENTIFIED BY THE GRAND JURY REPORT IN MAY OF THIS YEAR. AND ALSO SUPPORTED BY THE EFOC'S WORK.

I JUST WANTED TO INTERRUPT FOR A MINUTE, IF SOMEONE COULD -- COULD YOU PLEASE PULL THAT DOWN? SORRY.

OH. OKAY. SORRY, MARY.

NO.

I THOUGHT IT WAS TAKEN CARE OF, BUT IT WASN'T. I HAD TO SPEAK UP.

OH, NO. THANK YOU. I APPRECIATE YOU. DEFINITELY THE TIME TO SPEAK UP. I DID NOT NOTICE. JUST MOVING FORWARD, I WOULD LIKE TO SEE THE CITY COMMIT TO MAKING THAT REPAYMENT OF IMPORTANCE OF THE MISALLOCATED FUNDS, ESPECIALLY THE \$300,000 TO BE PUT BACK INTO THE ENTERPRISE FUND. MAINLY BECAUSE OF THE CRUCIAL WATER INFRASTRUCTURE REPAIRS, ITEMS COMING UP LIKE THE PLEASANT LOOP AND NUMBER FOUR. THOSE ARE CRITICAL NEEDS WITHIN THE CITY. AND I JUST WANTED TO SAY THE CITY AND COUNCIL ARE RUNNING, ESSENTIALLY RUNNING THE UTILITY DISTRICT. AND THE RATE PAYERS ARE PAYING FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE UTILITIES. AND THE CITY AND THE COUNCIL NEED TO DEVOTE THE CONCENTRATED TIME TO THE ENTERPRISE FUNDS AND INFRASTRUCTURE, AND WE'RE JUST LOOKING FOR THAT FOCUS. AND WE LOOKED TOWARDS THAT AS THE FINANCE COMMITTEE, WE LOOK TOWARDS THE EXAMPLES OF THIS FOCUS THROUGH PLACES LIKE SWEETWATER SPRINGS, WHICH IS OUR NEIGHBORHOOD WATER DISTRICT OR NEIGHBOR WATER DISTRICT. AND SO FOR THINGS LIKE THEIR MEETINGS INVOLVE LABORATORY TESTING, WATER PRODUCTION, LEAKS, ALL THE INFORMATION INCLUDING ALL THE LEAKS TO THE RAINFALL, GRANTS, ALL THESE THINGS. WE BELIEVE THE PUBLIC SHOULD FUNCTION LIKE A GENERAL MANAGER OF THE UTILITY DISTRICT.

MARY, THAT'S TWO MINUTES.

OH, SHOOT. THANK YOU. I'M SORRY.

THAT'S OKAY.

THANK YOU SO MUCH, EVERYBODY.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT I'LL COME BACK INTO CHAMBERS, IF THERE IS ANYONE IN C CHAMBERS? PLEASE.

GOOD EVENING, MY NAME'S STEVE EINSTEIN, AND I'M HERE TO TALK ABOUT CHAPTER 8.25 OF THE SEBASTOPOL MUNICIPAL CODE, AND IN PARTICULAR, THE NUMBER 55. INDIVIDUALS WHO PROTEST AT THE MAIN INTERSECTION IN TOWN EVERY FRIDAY AFTERNOON IN SUPPORT OF THE PALESTINIAN CAUSE HAVE EVERY RIGHT TO LIE AND DISTORT AND SPREAD FALSE INFORMATION ABOUT THE TRAGEDY THAT HAS BEFALLEN THE PALESTINIAN PEOPLE, ESPECIALLY IN GAZA. INDEED, IT'S A TRAGEDY FOR ALL THE PEOPLES OF THE MIDDLE EAST. THEIR SIGNS GROSSLY MISTAKEN DISTORT THE TRUTH FROM THE NUMBER OF INDIVIDUALS KILLED TO THE ROLE OF THE SPREADING OF CONSPIRACY THEORIES IS THEIR RIGHT. BUT NEVERMIND THAT. FREE SPEECH IS PROTECTED, EVEN WHEN IT'S HATE SPEECH. WHAT IS NOT PROTECTED IS EXCEEDING THE DECIBEL LIMITS AS SPELLED OUT IN THE MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 8.25. THAT'S THE NOISE CONTROL ORDINANCE. THESE DEMONSTRATORS HAVE BEEN BLASTING HATEFUL LYRICS FULL OF DISTORTIONS ABOUT ISRAEL AND THE JEWS WHO LIVE THERE FOR MANY MONTHS THROUGH A SOUND SYSTEM THAT WELL EXCEEDS THE LEGAL LIMIT OF FIVE DECIBELS. THAT'S THE LIMIT SPELLED OUT IN THE MUNICIPAL CODE IN THE CITY OF SEBASTOPOL, SECTION 8.25.060. NEVERMIND THE HATEFUL LYRICS THAT PORTRAY ISRAEL AS A STATE OF NAZI PEDOPHILES. THEIR SPEAKER USUALLY BLASTS THE INTERSECTION AND EVERYONE NEAR IT AT 90 TO 100 DECIBELS WELL IN EXCESS OF THE LAW.

STEVE, YOU HAVE 15 SECONDS.

GREAT. TO THIS POINT, THE SEBASTOPOL POLICE DEPARTMENT IN A MISTAKEN EFFORT TO RESPECT AND PROTECT FREE SPEECH HAS YET TO ENFORCE THE CODE. I HOPE THIS FRIDAY AND EVERY DAY GOING FORWARD OUR POLICE DEPARTMENT WILL RESPECT AND PROTECT THE RIGHTS OF ALL OF US BY FINALLY ENFORCING THE ORDINANCE. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT, I'LL GO BACK OUT TO ZOOM. IF THERE IS ANYONE ON ZOOM THAT WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT. MARY, CAN YOU UNMUTE YOURSELF, PLEASE?

YES.

THANK YOU, CAN YOU SEE THE TIMER?

YES. I'LL BE QUICK.

GO AHEAD, PLEASE.

I THINK IT'S TIME FOR US TO GO BACK TO THREE MINUTE COMMENTS. IT WAS WHAT, MAYBE THREE YEARS AGO THAT I THINK DIANA MADE IT -- TOOK IT DOWN TO TWO. PEOPLE SIMPLY DON'T HAVE TIME AND ARE USUALLY CUT OFF. I THINK IT IS IMPORTANT FOR THE COUNCIL TO HEAR WHAT PEOPLE HAVE TO SAY. I WAS HOPING MAYBE THAT COULD BE BROUGHT UP IN ANOTHER COUNCIL MEETING. THANK YOU.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT, I'LL COME BACK INTO CHAMBERS. PLEASE.

GOOD AFTERNOON, COUNCIL AND TO MAYOR, VICE MAYOR. AND I ALSO LIVE IN SEBASTOPOL. I'VE BEEN WORKING WITH WOODMARK TENANTS FOR THE LAST YEAR AS THEY'RE FIGHTING TO KEEP THEIR HOMES, KEEP A ROOF OVER THEIR HEADS. I WANTED TO SHARE SOME SOFT TRIUMPHS THAT HAVE BEEN HAPPENING OH THE LAST YEARS. THE LEADERS HAVE BEEN ENGAGING IN SUPPORTING OTHER RESIDENTS ACROSS SONOMA COUNTY IN THE MOBILE HOME PARK, AS WELL AS BUILDING CONNECTIONS WITH THEIR NEIGHBORS, THEIR NEW NEIGHBORS, FARM WORKING NEIGHBORS WHO LIVE IN THOSE UNITS. I WANTED TO SHARE THERE IS A TREND THAT WE'RE SEEING AS THIS KIND OF NEW STANDARD OF GOING BEYOND WHAT'S GOOD CAUSE AND REALLY STEPPING UP TO JUST CAUSE. SO I FEEL LIKE SEBASTOPOL REALLY SET A MODEL FOR HAVING JUST CAUSE FOR AFFORDABLE HOUSING COMPLEXES OF 45 UNITS AND MORE, WHICH IS A BEAUTIFUL NEW STANDARD THAT I THINK REALLY SETS THE TONE OF WHAT WE MEAN WHEN WE SAY HOUSING IS A HUMAN RIGHT HERE. SO THANK YOU FOR YOUR CONTINUE TO SUPPORT. WE HOPE YOU CAN AGENDAIZE JUST CAUSE SOONER THAN NOVEMBER. WE KNOW THAT TIME IS TICKING FOR FOLKS. THIS COMPANY WILL DO WHAT THEY CAN TO GET FOLKS OUT OF THEIR HOMES. WE WANT TO MAKE SURE FOLKS FEEL PROTECTED AND KEEP FIGHTING IN BUILDING A COMMUNITY. THANK YOU.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT, IF THERE IS ANYONE ON ZOOM THAT WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT FOR ITEMS NOT ON THE AGENDA TO PLEASE RAISE YOUR HAND VIRTUALLY? SEEING NONE, I'LL COME BACK INTO CHAMBERS. IF

ANYONE IN CHAMBERS THAT WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT FOR ITEMS NOT ON THE AGENDA? SEEING NONE, MAYOR, PUBLIC COMMENT IS CLOSED.

ALL RIGHT, THANK YOU ALL VERY MUCH. BEFORE WE GET INTO OUR CONSENT CALENDAR, I. I. I WANTED TO MENTION ITEM NUMBER 11 THAT WAS ON THE AGENDA, WHICH IS THE WATER INFRASTRUCTURE FINANCING OPTIONS HAS BEEN REMOVED FROM THE AGENDA. SO I JUST WANTED TO MAKE CERTAIN PEOPLE KNEW THAT IN THE AUDIENCE, JUST IN CASE YOU'RE THERE FOR THAT ITEM. SO MOVING ONTO THE CONSENT CALENDAR. I'M GOING TO GO AHEAD AND READ THE ITEMS, AND THEN WE'LL FIND OUT IF ANYONE WANTS TO PULL ANYTHING. NUMBER ONE IS APPROVAL OF CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES FOR REGULAR MEETING OF AUGUST 4, 2026. NUMBER TWO, IS APPROVAL OF ADOPTION OF CITY POLICY REQUIRING ANNUAL REQUEST FOR THE BARLOW HOTEL TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TAX TOT REBATE MARKETING EXPENDITURES. APPROVAL REQUIRES CITY STAFF PLANNING DEPARTMENT, BY MARCH 1 OF EACH YEAR DURING THE REBATE PERIOD, TO FORMALLY REQUEST THE ANNUAL MARKETING EXPENDITURE REPORT FROM THE HOTEL OWNER. NUMBER THREE, APPROVAL OF NOTICE OF INTENT TO AMEND THE CITY OF SEBASTOPOL CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODE. AMENDMENTS ARE ROUTINE AMENDMENTS SUCH AS CURRENT JOB CLASSIFICATIONS. NUMBER FOUR, APPROVAL OF SECOND READING IN THE ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE HAD TO ADD CHAPTER 5.66, NEWSRACK REGULATIONS TO THE SEBASTOPOL MUNICIPAL CODE. NUMBER FIVE, APPROVAL OF NOTICE OF COMPLETION FOR BODEGA PHASE TWO BIKE LANE PROJECT. NUMBER SIX, APPROVAL OF NOTICE OF COMPLETION FOR DIGOUTS AND REPAIR PAVING PROJECT. NUMBER SEVEN, AWARD CONTRACT FOR PEDESTRIAN CROSSING ENHANCEMENTS ON STATE ROUTE 116. SO I JUST WANTED TO ASK, DOES ANYONE WANT -- DO ANY COUNCIL MEMBERS WANT TO PULL AN ITEM?

THERE'S NONE IN CHAMBERS.

OKAY. I WILL NEED TO PULL NUMBER TWO JUST SIMPLY TO VOTE SEPARATELY BECAUSE I PRECLUDED FROM VOTING ON THAT ONE ITEM. SO WHEN WE MAKE A MOTION, IT WOULD NEED TO EXCLUDE NUMBER TWO, AND DO THAT SEPARATELY WITH EVERYBODY ELSE. SO ANY WAY, GO AHEAD, MARY F YOU WANT TO DO PUBLIC COMMENT.

COUNCILMEMBER HINTON HAS HER HAND RAISED.

OH, I'M SORRY. I DIDN'T SEE IT THERE.

IT'S OKAY. I WAS JUST GETTING READY FOR A MOTION, AND THEN YOU REMINDED ME OF THAT PUBLIC COMMENT. SO I'LL HOLD THAT.

THANK YOU. SO NOW IS THE OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC COMMENT FOR ITEMS ON THE CONSENT CALENDAR ONLY. IF YOU'D LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT, AGAIN, IT'S A TWO-MINUTE PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD. I'LL GO TO CHAMBERS FIRST, THEN GO OUT TO ZOOM. IF ANYONE IN CHAMBERS WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT ON THE CONSENT CALENDAR ITEM? SEEING NONE, I'LL GO OUT TO ZOOM. KYLE, CAN YOU UNMUTE YOURSELF, PLEASE?

I CAN. AND I APOLOGIZE FOR TAKING THIS OPPORTUNITY TO DO A POINT OF ORDER BECAUSE BASED ON OUR ZOOM SETTINGS, THERE REALLY ISN'T A PRACTICE BY WHICH A MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC CAN CALL FOR A POINT OF ORDER. SPECIFICALLY I WANT TO ADDRESS THE MAYOR'S ACTION OF ANNOUNCING THE REMOVAL OF AN AGENDA ITEM FOLLOWING PUBLIC COMMENT FOR ITEMS NOT ON THE AGENDA. WHAT THAT HAS DONE HAS REDUCED THE OPPORTUNITY FOR THE PUBLIC TO COMMENT ON THAT ITEM. NOT ONLY DOES THE PUBLIC NO LONGER HAVE THE ABILITY TO COMMENT ON THAT ITEM AS AN AGENDIZED ITEM TONIGHT. BY WAITING UNTIL AFTER PUBLIC COMMENT FOR ITEMS THAT ARE NOT ON THE AGENDA, YOU HAVE ACTIVELY RESTRICTED THE ABILITY FOR FOLKS TO PUBLICLY COMMENT ON THAT ITEM DURING THAT PERIOD OF TIME. SO IN THE FUTURE, IT WOULD SEEM APPROPRIATE THAT WE PULL ITEMS AT THE START OF THE MEETING AND NOT WAIT UNTIL THE PUBLIC HAS PROVIDED US PUBLIC COMMENT, AND I WOULD BE INTERESTED IN HEARING FROM EITHER THE ATTORNEY OR THE COUNCIL AS A WHOLE AS TO THIS PRACTICE AND THE LEGALITY OF THAT PRACTICE. THANKS.

THANK YOU, KYLE FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT, I'LL COME BACK INTO CHAMBERS. IF ANYONE IN CHAMBERS? SEEING NONE, I'LL GO BACK OUT TO ZOOM. LEE, CAN YOU UNMUTE YOURSELF, PLEASE?

YES. CAN YOU HEAR ME?

YES, THANK YOU. CAN YOU SEE THE TIMER?

I CAN.

GREAT, GO AHEAD, PLEASE.

YEAH, I DON'T KNOW IF ANYONE ELSE HAS NOTICED, BACK AND FORTH AT THE BODEGA BAY THIS PAST WEEK, AND I DROVE BY THIS NEW BODEGA BAY PROJECT, COMPLETED PROJECT THAT'S ON THE CONSENT CALENDAR, A NUMBER OF TIMES. IT LOOKS LIKE IT WAS A \$2.25 MILLION PROJECT. IT APPEARS THERE'S ABOUT MAYBE GENEROUSLY 100 YARDS OF PAVEMENT THAT'S BEEN RESTORED? THERE IS ABOUT 20 YARDS, MAYBE 10 OF PROTECTED BIKE LANE AND THE PROTECTED BIKE LANE REALLY DOESN'T ATTACH TO A BIKE LANE. IT ATTACHES TO A PATH ACROSS THE BRIDGE ON ONE END. ON THE OTHER END, IT GOES DOWN THE BODEGA AVENUE WHERE THERE ISN'T ANY BIKE LANE. I DON'T KNOW IF ANYBODY ELSE THINKS \$2.25 MILLION IS A LOT FOR WHAT WAS DONE THERE? AND AT THE TIME I WAS DRIVING A MOTOR HOME, WHICH IF YOU HAVE EVER WRITTEN THE MOTOR HOME OR A BAD ROAD, IT IS REALLY BAD. YOU HEAR EVERY LITTLE POTHOLE, AND BODEGA IS RIGHT UP THERE WITH THE ROADS I'VE TRAVELED ON IN THE UNITED STATES IN THE LAST YEAR. SO THERE IS A LOT MORE WORK TO BE DONE. IT'S GOING TO BE REALLY, REALLY EXPENSIVE. THANK YOU.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. IF ANYONE IN CHAMBERS WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT ON THE CONSENT CALENDAR ITEMS? SEEING NONE, I'LL GO BACK OUT TO ZOOM. IF ANYONE ON ZOOM WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT ON CONSENT CALENDAR ITEMS ONLY? SEEING NONE. THE CONSENT CALENDAR IS CLOSED FOR PUBLIC COMMENT.

THANK YOU. AND ALEX, CAN YOU ADDRESS THE QUESTION THERE? I KNOW IT WAS EXPLAINED TO ME THAT I WASN'T EVEN NECESSARY TO ANNOUNCE IT, BUT I REALIZED I PROBABLY SHOULD. SO CAN YOU, AS FAR AS THE ITEM BEING PULLED? CAN YOU ADDRESS THAT?

YEAH, THE POSTED AGENDA HAS BEEN REVISED, AND IT IS NOTED ON THE AGENDA THAT THE ITEM WAS PULLED.

I'M SORRY, ALEX. CAN YOU SPEAK INTO THE MICROPHONE?

I SAID THE AGENDA WAS REVISED AND REPOSTED WITH STATING THE ITEM HAS BEEN REMOVED.

AND WILL THERE BE OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC COMMENT ON THAT ITEM WHEN IT'S PULLED AND REVOTED FOR?

WHEN THE ITEM COMES BACK TO THE COUNCIL, YES.

I'M TALKING ABOUT THE ONE PULLED OFF THE CONSENT. WILL THAT HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC TO COMMENT ON THAT?

NOTHING HAS BEEN PULLED OFF OF CONSENT. YES, FOR THE BARLOW? YES.

OKAY, THANK YOU.

ALL RIGHT. SO WE ARE GOING TO -- CAN WE GO WITH THE ITEMS? WE'RE ADDRESSING ONE, THREE, FOUR, FIVE, SIX, SEVEN, CORRECT? FIRST?

CORRECT. WE NEED A MOTION AND A SECOND.

OKAY.

I'LL MAKE A MOTION. FOR THOSE ITEMS.

COUNCILMEMBER HINTON HAS HER HAND UP. I DON'T KNOW IF SHE HAS A QUESTION OR MOTION? GO AHEAD.

AS I WAS A LITTLE EARLY ON THE DRAW, I'M HAPPY TO MOVE THE ITEMS ON CONSENT AGENDA OF ONE, THREE, FOUR, FIVE, SIX, AND SEVEN.

SECONDED.

THANK YOU, MAYOR. SO WE HAVE A MOTION AND A SECOND, SO MOVED BY COUNCILMEMBER HINTON AND SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN TO APPROVE CONSENT CALENDAR ITEMS ONE, FOUR, FIVE, SIX, AND SEVEN. NUMBER TWO HAS BEEN REMOVED. COUNTERCARTER?

YES.

COUNCILMEMBER HINTON?

AYE.

COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN?

YES.

VICE MAYOR?

YES.

MAYOR MCLEWIS?

YES.

MOTION PASSES UNANIMOUSLY.

SO JUST TO BE CLEAR, ALEX, YOU SAID WE NEED TO HAVE A SECOND PUBLIC COMMENT FOR ITEM NUMBER TWO? I'M TRYING TO FOLLOW HERE.

NO. SINCE IT WAS PULLED, PEOPLE CAN NOW, MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL.

I THOUGHT THE QUESTION WAS ABOUT PUBLIC COMMENT, NOT ABOUT COUNCIL COMMENT. AM I UNDERSTANDING?

I THOUGHT IT WAS ABOUT COUNCIL.

NO, MY QUESTION WAS BASED ON WHAT KYLE HAD SAID, HE CALLED FOR A POINT OF ORDER HERE BECAUSE IF IT WAS PULLED. COULD PEOPLE HAVE MADE COMMENTS ON THE ITEM DURING THE COMMENTS ON CONSENT CALENDAR?

SO PEOPLE CAN MAKE COMMENTS ABOUT ITEM TWO ON THE CONSENT.

THEY COULD HAVE.

I BELIEVE KYLE WAS SPEAKING ABOUT ITEM 11, WHICH IS NOT A PART OF THE CONSENT CALENDAR.

NO, I'M SURE HE WAS SPEAKING ABOUT ITEM TWO, WASN'T HE?

NO. LET ME CLARIFY. I SPOKE BEFORE CONSENT CALENDAR. I SAID ITEM NUMBER 11, WHICH WAS, JUST SO I SPEAK CLEARLY, WAS POSTPONED, NUMBER 11, WHICH WAS THE WATER INFRASTRUCTURE FINANCING OPTIONS BEFORE I STARTED THE CONSENT CALENDAR. I MENTIONED THAT ONE HAD BEEN POSTPONED. IT WAS EXPLAINED TO ME BECAUSE THE AGENDA WAS REVISED PREVIOUSLY, IT WASN'T NECESSARILY TO MAKE A BIG ANNOUNCEMENT, BUT JUST OCCURRED TO ME THAT I WANTED TO MAKE THAT ANNOUNCEMENT BEFORE WE GOT, YOU KNOW, INTO THE MEETING TOO FAR AND PEOPLE WERE SITTING THERE. I WAS TRYING TO BE COURTEOUS AND MENTION IT EVEN THOUGH IT WAS NOT NECESSARY. BUT THE COMMENTER WAS ASKING WHETHER OR NOT THAT IMPACTED PUBLIC COMMENT. SO THAT'S WHAT I WAS ASKING, YOU KNOW, ALEX TO ADDRESS THAT STATEMENT ABOUT PUBLIC COMMENT, AND, YOU KNOW, WAS THERE ANY ISSUE WITH WHAT WE DID WITH PULLING THAT, YOU KNOW, ME NOT ANNOUNCING IT AT THE VERY BEGINNING OF THE MEETING VERSES NOW. THAT'S WHAT I WAS TALKING ABOUT, VICE MAYOR, IF THAT HELPS.

YEAH. IT'S FINE. MAYBE I JUST MISUNDERSTOOD, KYLE.

OKAY. ALL RIGHT, SO ARE WE CLEAR? IS IT OKAY IF WE GO ON TO ITEM NUMBER TWO, MARY?

YES.

OKAY. SO I NEED TO REMAIN OUT OF THIS VOTE, SO SOMEONE NEEDS TO MAKE A MOTION AND A SECOND FOR ITEM NUMBER TWO.

COUNCILMEMBER HINTON HAS HER HAND UP.

YEP.

I'M HAPPY TO MOVE ON CONSENT AGENDA ITEM NUMBER TWO FOR APPROVAL OF ADOPTION OF CITY POLICY REQUIRING ANNUAL REQUEST FOR THE BARLOW HOTEL TRANSIENT OCCUPANCY TOT TAX REBATE, FOR MARKETING EXPENSES.

I'LL SECOND.

THANK YOU. SO MOVED BY COUNCILMEMBER HINTON, SECONDED BY COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN TO APPROVE CONSENT CALENDAR ITEM TWO, WHICH IS THE CITY POLICY TO DIRECT THE RETURN TO THE CITY COUNCIL REQUIRING THE ANNUAL MARCH REVIEW OF THE MARKETING PLAN FROM THE HOTEL OWNER. COUNCILMEMBER CARTER?

YES.

COUNCILMEMBER HINTON?

AYE.

COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN?

YES.

VICE MAYOR MAURER?

YES.

MAYOR MCLEWIS?

I'M ABSTAINING FROM THAT.

MOTION PASSES 4-1 WITH COUNCIL MEMBERS CARTER, ZOLLMAN, HINTON, AND MAURER APPROVING, AND MAYOR MCLEWIS ABSTAINING.

OKAY. THANK YOU. SO WE'RE GOING TO GO TO OUR INFORMATIONAL ITEMS. NUMBER EIGHT, WHICH IS PRESENTATION FROM ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL ON STATUS OF GRAVENSTEIN COMMONS, STATUS OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT MEETING, AND UPDATE ON GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY OR AFFIRMATIONS. I BELIEVE THIS IS BEING HANDLED BY OUR CITY MANAGER. IS THAT CORRECT?

THAT IS CORRECT, THANK YOU, MAYOR. SO THIS IS AN INFORMATIONAL ITEM AS THE COUNCIL AND THE COMMUNITY IS AWARE. THIS IS A 22-UNIT PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING UNIT LOCATED AT GRAVENSTEIN HIGHWAY NORTH. THE ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL SOCIETY IS THE OWNER AND THE DEVELOPER, AND THE CITY REMAINS THE HOME KEY APPLICANT WITH ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL. AS REPORTED IN THE AUGUST REPORT, THEIR CONSTRUCTION IS ABOUT 80% COMPLETE. THEIR TARGETED COMPLETION DATE IS AROUND NOVEMBER OF 2026 WITH THE MOVEMENT TO FOLLOW AFTER THE CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY. THEY ANTICIPATE A 90% OCCUPANCY BY JANUARY OF 28. THE CITY DOES HAVE A CONSULTANT THAT HAS BEEN MONITORING THE COMPLIANCE, AND THEY HAVE MET THEIR HOME KEY PERFORMANCE MILE ACCORDINGLY. WE DO HAVE LAUREN TAYLOR HERE. WE HAVE, WHO IS FROM ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL. WE ALSO HAVE STEFANI WHO IS THE CITY'S CONSULTANT, THAT'S OVERSEEING THE COMPLIANCE. AND I'M TRYING TO SEE IF JACK TIBBETS IS ON THE CALL. LET ME JUST GET THERE. I DO NOT SEE HIM YET. BUT THIS ITEM IS TO DISCUSS THE CONSTRUCTION PROGRESS THROUGH THE REMAINING SCHEDULE. DEFENDING ANY AWARDS THAT HAVE BEEN, YOU KNOW, ALLOCATED, BUT NOT YET RECEIVED. THE CUTS, STAFFING MODEL. LAUREN WILL GO INTO THAT. THE COORDINATED ENTRY, AND THE REFERRALS OF ANY WEST COUNTY OR SEBASTOPOL ELIGIBILITY. THE COMMUNITY OUTREACH AND THE PLANNED COMMUNITY MEETINGS, AS WELL AS ANY TYPE OF GOOD NEIGHBOR PROTOCOLS. SO HAVING SAID THAT, LAUREN AND ROBIN AND I'LL SEE IF I COULD GET JACK ON BOARD. SO IF YOU WANT TO GO UP TO THE PODIUM AND DO YOUR PRESENTATION.

YEAH, AND TRY TO KEEP OUR TOTAL PRESENTATIONS, YOU KNOW, TEN MINUTES OR UNDER. SO I WANT TO MAKE SURE YOU'RE AWARE OF THAT.

GOOD EVENING, COUNCILMEMBERS. NICE TO MEET ALL OF YOU. I THINK I KNOW A COUPLE OF YOU MORE PERSONALLY. CAN YOU HEAR ME OKAY?

YES.

MY NAME IS LAUREN TAYLOR, AND YES, I TOOK ON THE POSITION AS EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR AT ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL ABOUT TEN WEEKS AGO. SO I'VE BEEN DRINKING FROM THE PROVERBIAL FIRE HOSE AS YOU CAN IMAGINE. BUT HERE TONIGHT TO JUST PROVIDE OR ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS YOU MIGHT HAVE. I KNOW THERE'S BEEN A LOT ABOUT THE PROJECT AND YOUR PREVIOUS EXPERIENCE WITH ANOTHER PSH COMMUNITY DOWN THE STREET, WHICH I'M DEEPLY FAMILIAR WITH. I THINK THE MOST CONSTRUCTION FINANCIALS, BUT THE BIGGEST CONCERNS THAT I'VE HEARD IS JUST AROUND THE FINANCIAL GAP THAT WE HAD TO COMPLETE THE PROJECT. WE ARE CLOSER TO ABOUT 90% COMPLETION NOW, AND WE DID, WE DID RECEIVE A \$1 MILLION MEASURE O FUNDING FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES, SO WE ARE VERY EXCITED AND GRATEFUL FOR THAT. WE HAVE ANOTHER \$200,000 COMING IN FROM THE SONOMA COUNTY COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION. AND THE REMAINING FUNDS TO COMPLETE THE PROJECT WILL BE -- WE WILL BE USING OUR LINE OF CREDIT TO COMPLETE THAT. MORE NOTABLY AND MOST, I'M EXCITED TO SHARE IS OUR OPERATION PLAN. SO WE HAVE, AS YOU HAD IN THE REPORT, TAKEN ON A PARTNERSHIP WITH COTS, COMMITTEE ON THE SHELTER LIST. THEY HAVE DEEP EXPERIENCE AND KNOWLEDGE ABOUT IN THE HOMELESSNESS AND HOUSING SPACE. I PERSONALLY HAVE WORKED WITH THE ORGANIZATION, NOT WORKED WITH THEM, BUT ALONGSIDE THEM IN PARTNERSHIP FOR THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS. SO I REALLY HAVE A LOT OF TRUST IN THIS PATH FORWARD WITH THEM. CHRIS CABRILL IS THE CEO OF COTS, ALSO HERE TONIGHT, AND HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS YOU MAY HAVE. THERE ARE ALSO OTHERS IN THE ROOM, THE DIRECTOR OF COORDINATED ENTRY, AND HUNTER SCOTT WHO IS ALSO GIVING ANOTHER PRESENTATION. MARK KRUG HAS BEEN THE CONSULTANT THAT SOME OF YOU MIGHT KNOW FROM PREVIOUS WORK WITH HIM. SO WE HAVE A LOT OF KNOWLEDGEABLE PEOPLE IN THE ROOM TO ANSWER ANY QUESTIONS YOU MIGHT HAVE. THANKS SO MUCH. DO YOU HAVE A QUESTION? GO FOR IT.

JILL, I HAVE A QUESTION.

YEAH, I DIDN'T.

YEAH, USUALLY I RUN THE MEETING, WHEN PEOPLE HAVE QUESTIONS. BUT DO YOU NEED TO ASK IT NOW OR DO YOU WANT TO ASK IT LATER?

YEAH, I WOULD LIKE TO ASK IT NOW. IF YOU CAN ANSWER IT, MAYBE ONE OF THE OTHER SPEAKERS COULD ANSWER IT. HAVE YOU REVIEWED OR HAS ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL BOARD REVIEWED THE GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY? AND IF YES, WHAT ARE YOUR THOUGHTS ON IT?

I DON'T KNOW IF THE BOARD DID. I DID. AND THERE ARE SOME PARTS THAT STAND OUT, JUST AROUND PARTICULARLY AND NOW THAT WE WON'T FULLY BE OPERATING THE SITE. IT WILL REALLY BE COTS. I FEEL THEY'RE HONESTLY -- I WOULD LEAVE IT UP TO THEM TO ANSWER THE QUESTIONS. SORRY, I'M SCROLLING TO IT HERE. I THINK THE MAIN THING THAT STOOD OUT WAS KIND OF AROUND THE NEIGHBORHOOD PATROLS AND BEING ON THE PROPERTY MANAGER TO PATROL THE SURROUNDING AREA. THAT JUST SEEMS LIKE A BIT MUCH OF AN EXPECTATION FRANKLY. AROUND THE RESIDENT PORTION, I THINK THERE IS AN INTAKE AND AN ASSESSMENT PROCESS FOR ELIGIBILITY. ALL RESIDENTS WILL COME THROUGH COORDINATED ENTRY. SO THE OTHER LANGUAGE JUST SOUNDS LIKE LOOSE TERMINOLOGY FOR FOLKS THAT NEED TO FOLLOW A LEASE OF WHICH.

ALEX, SHOULD WE BE DISCUSSING THAT TOPIC WHEN IT IS ANOTHER ITEM ON THE AGENDA?

YEAH, IT'S FINE TO ASK THEM.

I JUST WANT TO MAKE SURE. I WANT TO MAKE SURE WE'RE IN COMPLIANCE.

OKAY, I HAVE ONE OTHER QUESTION.

SURE.

AND THAT IS REGARDING THE COUNTY OFFERED \$3 MILLION TO YOUR ORGANIZATION. AND HOW WILL YOU FOLLOW UP TO TRY TO OBTAIN THAT?

YES. THERE HAS BEEN A LOT OF FOLLOW UP ON THAT SINCE I JOINED THE ORGANIZATION. I HAVE MET WITH OTHERS STILL ON THE CALL OR THE MEETING, BUT I HAVE MET WITH LINDA HOPKINS AND TRACY ABOUT THAT. AND OF THE DEVELOPMENT COMMISSION. I MET WITH HUNTER SCOTT, DHS, SO WE HAVE BEEN EXPLORING POSSIBILITIES AROUND WHAT WE CAN RETRIEVE OR CAPTURE FROM THAT \$3 MILLION THAT WAS COMMITTED, KNOWING THAT IT WAS COMMITTED BY A PREVIOUS DIRECTOR AND NOT THROUGH A LEGITIMATE NOTICE OF FUNDING OPPORTUNITY. SO YEAH. IT'S BEEN A BIT OF A STRUGGLE, BUT WE'RE COMMITTED TO FINISHING THE PROJECT REGARDLESS.

THANK YOU.

SURE.

ALL RIGHT. ARE WE FINISHED WITH THE PRESENTATION? I'M SORRY. I CAN'T SEE.

I WOULD LIKE TO GIVE ROBIN AN OPPORTUNITY TO GO OVER THE CONSTRUCTION.

I'M SORRY. ALL I COULD SEE WAS THE SPEAKER. I COULDN'T SEE ANYONE ELSE THERE. OKAY.

HI, ROBIN STEFANI FROM EIGHTH WAVE. I'VE BEEN PARTICIPATING IN THE CONSTRUCTION PORTION OF THE PROJECT AND ALSO THE COMPLIANCE WITH THE STANDARD AGREEMENT. AND AS LAUREN SAID AND INDICATED IN THE REPORT, THE CONSTRUCTION IS AT ABOUT 90%. AND GOING VERY WELL. IT IS EXPECTED TO REACH A TEMPORARY OCCUPANCY IN MIDDLE TO END OCTOBER PER SCHEDULE. SO THAT'S BEEN GOING REALLY WELL. THERE HAVE BEEN A COUPLE OF LARGE SUBSTANTIAL CHANGE ORDERS THAT RELATE TO THE SITE. BUT IN TERMS OF ANYTHING OUT OF THE GROUND, THAT'S BEEN VERY STRAIGHTFORWARD. AND SO I DON'T WANT TO TAKE UP TOO MUCH OF YOUR TIME, BUT IF YOU HAVE SPECIFIC QUESTIONS ABOUT THE CONSTRUCTION OR THE BUDGET OR THE TIMELINE OR THE HCD STANDARD AGREEMENT, I'M HAPPY TO ANSWER ANY OF YOUR QUESTIONS.

THANK YOU VERY MUCH I. APPRECIATE IT. I KNOW OUR COUNCIL MEMBER, ZOLLMAN HAS A QUESTION?

YEAH. THAT CONCLUDES THE PRESENTATION. I REALLY WANT TO FOCUS IN ON RESIDENT SELECTION. I ALSO WANT TO BE ABLE TO GET AN ANSWER ABOUT THE GOOD NEIGHBOR PROVISION FROM WHOEVER WANTS TO DIRECTLY ANSWER THAT. FIRST QUESTION IS ABOUT THE RESIDENT SELECTION. WHAT I REMEMBER HEARING FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH REPRESENTATIVES BEFORE, THINGS SEEM TO HAVE EVOLVED FROM

MY PERSPECTIVE ABOUT THE RESIDENT SELECTION. STAFF POINTED OUT THE SPECIFIC QUESTIONS TO ASK, AND YOU CAN REFER TO PAGE -- PAGE FOUR OF THE STAFF REPORT. IF YOU WANT TO KNOW WHERE I'M GOING WITH ALL THESE QUESTIONS. SENSUALLY IT SAYS THE CITY WILL HAVE SOME WAY TO PARTICIPATE IN RESIDENT SELECTION, BUT IT SEEMS VERY UNCLEAR TO ME ABOUT EXACTLY WHAT THAT ROAD MAP WILL LOOK LIKE. ABOUT HOW AND WHEN WE COULD ACTUALLY START PARTICIPATING IN RESIDENT SELECTION. SO WHOEVER WANTS TO ADDRESS THAT?

I DON'T KNOW IF YOU WANT?

HI, I'M KRIS. NICE TO SEE EVERYBODY. I'LL DO MY BEST TO ANSWER THAT QUESTION. I MAY ASK YOU TO JUMP IN ON THE COORDINATED ENTRY. SO MY UNDERSTANDING, ALL THE RESIDENTS COMING THROUGH WILL COME THROUGH COORDINATED ENTRY. THERE WILL BE AN OPPORTUNITY FOR WHEN THE PROJECT IS SET UP FOR COORDINATED REFERRALS FOR THE PROVIDER, CITY OF RECEIVE S ALL THE PARTNERS TO COME TOGETHER TO DISCUSS FACTORS AND CRITERIA. THE COORDINATED ENTRY SYSTEM IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR SETTING THE CRITERIA, RIGHT? THAT IS UP TO THE PROVIDER AND THE OWNER, AND IT IS REALLY TIED TO THE FUNDING MECHANISM FOR THE PROPERTY. SO WHATEVER WE TELL COORDINATED ENTRY IS WHAT COORDINATED ENTRY WILL DO. I'M SORRY IF I MISSPOKE. PLEASE CORRECT ME IF I'M WRONG. BUT IT WOULD BE AT THAT POINT WHEN SETTING UP RESIDENT CRITERIA FOR SELECTION THROUGH COORDINATED ENTRY THAT THE CITY WOULD HAVE INPUT.

OKAY BECAUSE I JUST REALLY WANT TO BE CLEAR AS ANNOUNCED BEFORE. AISLE ROLLING OFF COUNCIL. I HAVE A FEELING OF RESPONSIBILITY TO MY COLLEAGUES, ESPECIALLY BEING THE LIAISON IN MANY WAYS TO OUR SHELTERS. I REALLY NEED THIS BROKEN DOWN. BECAUSE THE TIMELINE SEEMS TO NOW HAVE BEEN EXTENDED ABOUT WHEN PEOPLE ARE REALLY GOING TO GET KEYS TO THE DOOR. SO I REALLY NEED THIS TO BE SLOWED DOWN AND TALK ABOUT TIMELINES, SO THAT STAFF IS VERY CLEAR TOO, AND WHOEVER TAKES OVER MY POSITION IS VERY CLEAR. SO THE ANTICIPATED MOVE-IN DATE SEEMS TO NOW BE NOVEMBER OR JANUARY? I DON'T KNOW. IF SOMEBODY COULD HELP ME. WHERE I'M GOING IS I WANT IT LITERALLY BACKED UP FROM THE DATE SOMEBODY THINKS THEY ARE GOING TO GET KEYS TO WHEN WE'RE GOING TO HAVE CITY PARTICIPATION? WHO IS INVITED INTO THESE MEETINGS? WHAT INFORMATION WILL BE ABLE TO BE SHARED ABOUT THE POTENTIAL RESIDENTS? AND THEN ALSO ALL THESE PEOPLE FROM THE COMMUNITY, WHEN DID THEY GET TO HEAR ABOUT WHO THEIR NEIGHBORS ARE GOING TO BE? THAT IS HOW NITTY-GRITTY AND GRANULAR I NEED TO BE HERE TONIGHT.

TOTALLY FAIR. I'LL DO MY BEST AND ALSO RELY ON THE TWO OF YOU PROBABLY FOR CONSTRUCTION. SO WE HAVE TO WAIT FOR CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY AS THE PROVIDER TO START MOVING PEOPLE IN. AND I'LL TRY TO BE AS CLEAR WITHOUT MUDDYING THE WATERS AS I CAN BE. SO OUR PLAN BECAUSE ST. THE ST. DOESN'T HAVE OPERATING MONEY TO OPERATE THE PROJECT. COTS DOES HAVE MONEY TO OPERATE THE PROJECT. HOWEVER, THE WAY THAT'S GOING TO BE DONE IS BY US ELIMINATING SOME OF OUR EXISTING MASTER LEASES, RIGHT? AND SO FOLKS THAT HAVE BEEN LIVING ALREADY FOR SOME TIME, WHO ARE ALREADY STABLE. THEY ALREADY HAVE ACCESS TO CLINICAL SERVICES, THEY ALREADY HAVE A RELATIONSHIP WITH A CASE MANAGER. THEY ALREADY KNOW WHAT IT IS LIKE TO LIVE IN PSH AND LIVE IN THEIR OWN HOME, THOSE ARE THE FOLKS THAT WILL BE MOVING IN FIRST. SO IT DEPENDS ON ONCE CONSTRUCTION IS DONE AND WE CAN GET PEOPLE MOVED. FOR SOME OF THOSE FOLKS, IT WILL BE WITHIN THE FIRST TWO WEEK OF CONSTRUCTION FINISHING. FOR SOME OF THEM, IT WILL TAKE THEM LONGER. WE'VE GOT PEOPLE THAT HAVE DISABLING CONDITIONS. IT'S GOING TO TAKE SOMEBODY WHOSE IN A WHEELCHAIR WHO HAS LIVED IN A UNIT FOR 15 YEARS MORE THAN TWO WEEKS TO PACK THEIR STUFF AND MOVE. RIGHT? SO IT MIGHT TAKE THAT PERSON 45 DAYS. WE'RE GOING TO HELP THEM WITH THAT, BUT WE'RE NOT GOING TO PRESSURE THEM. AND I ALSO WANT TO HELP ALL OF YOU UNDERSTAND AND THE COMMUNITY KNOW THAT IT IS A LOT BETTER FOR THE SURROUNDING COMMUNITY TO TAKE YOUR TIME WITH LEASE UP. WHEN YOU PUT SOMEBODY IN A SITUATION THAT'S BRAND NEW TO THEM. ALL THEIR NEIGHBORS ARE NEW. COMMUNITY IS NEW. THEY DON'T KNOW WHERE ANYTHING IS. THEY MIGHT HAVE TO CHANGE THEIR HEALTHCARE PROVIDER, RIGHT? THEY MIGHT JUST BE IN A

COMMUNITY THAT THEY ARE NOT FAMILIAR WITH. THEY HAVE TO KIND OF LEARN WHERE THEY ARE AND LEARN THEIR NEIGHBORS. GIVING THEM TIME TO DO THAT WITHOUT OVERWHELMING THEM WITH 21 PEOPLE MOVING IN ALL AT THE SAME TIME, IT MIGHT BE BETTER. EVEN WHEN LEASE ISN'T DONE UNTIL MARCH, THERE IS A WHOLE LOT LESS DISRUPTIONS TO THE SURROUNDING COMMUNITY IF WE MOVE IN TWO PEOPLE AND THEN TWO PEOPLE, AND THEN TWO PEOPLE. SO YOU'RE GETTING A LOT OF FOLKS IN THIS PROJECT WHO ARE FUNDED WITH DHS FUNDING AND HUD CONTINUUM OF CARE FUNDING, SUPPLEMENTED THROUGH MEDI-CAL FUNDING. AND THEN ONCE THOSE UNITS OPEN, RIGHT? ONCE WE HAVE UNIT TURNOVER, THEN WE WILL GO THROUGH COORDINATED ENTRY TO FILL THOSE UNITS, RIGHT? SO YOU'RE GETTING ESTABLISHED TENANTS THAT WANT TO LIVE IN SEBASTOPOL. THEY KNOW HOW PSH OPERATION. THEY ARE VERY STABLE. THOSE ARE THE FIRST UNITS THAT ARE GOING TO BE FILLED. THOSE ARE THE FIRST TENANTS THAT YOU'RE GETTING. AS WE HAVE UNIT TURNOVER, PEOPLE WILL COME THROUGH COORDINATED ENTRY. THE PEOPLE WHO ARE MOVING IN DID GO THROUGH COORDINATED ENTRY, BUT THEY WENT THROUGH COORDINATED ENTRY FIVE YEARS AGO, TEN YEARS AGO, TWO YEARS AGO, RIGHT? AS OUR UNITS BECAME OPEN. THOSE ARE THE FOLKS MOVING IN FIRST. I WANT TO STOP THERE AND TAKE QUESTIONS. NO, I APPRECIATE THAT. WHO WILL BE THE POINT OF CONTACT? IT SOUNDS LIKE BECAUSE YOU'RE IN CHARGE OF THE OPERATING FUNDS. IS MARY REACHING OUT TO YOU WHEN PEOPLE HEAR THINGS IN THE COMMUNITY, AND THEY'RE LIKE, IT SEEMS LIKE SOMEONE IS MOVING IN, BUT YET WE HAVEN'T HAD A COMMUNITY MEETING YET? NO ONE KNOWS WHAT'S HAPPENING BECAUSE WHERE I'M COMING FROM, I DO NOT WANT A REPEAT OF ELDERBERRY. I WANT PEOPLE TO BE FULLY KNOWLEDGEABLE. SO IS MARY REACHING OUT TO YOU? ARE YOU THE NEW CONTACT FOR WHATEVER QUESTIONS WE HAVE MOVING FORWARD?

YEAH, GOOD QUESTION. I THINK IT WOULD BE TOTALLY APPROPRIATE TO ENGAGE BOTH LAUREN AND I RIGHT NOW WITH ANY QUESTIONS ABOUT MOVE IN, SUPPORTIVE SERVICES, WHO WILL BE THERE AND WHEN THEY'RE MOVING IN. SO WE'RE NOT LIKE SIGNED ON THE DOTTED LINE, BUT WE KNOW EACH OTHER WELL. WE'RE WORKING WITH MARK KRUG, HE'S SUPER HELPFUL. THAT'S WHERE WE'RE GOING TO END UP. I THINK IT'S TOTALLY APPROPRIATE TO DO THAT. I MEAN, COTS ISN'T FAMILIAR WITH ALL OF YOU. WE DO HAVE OPERATIONS IN SEBASTOPOL ALREADY. WE'VE GOT A PSH PROPERTY HERE. WE ALSO DO PREVENTION WORK HERE. SO HAPPY TO ENGAGE WITH YOU IN ANY WAY THAT MAKES SENSE FOR YOU AND FOR THE COMMUNITY. YOU CAN REACH OUT ANY TIME. I E-MAIL REALLY FAST.

WE HAVE ANOTHER COUNCILMEMBER WHO HAS A QUESTION. I DIDN'T KNOW IF IT IS OKAY IF WE KIND OF BOUNCE THE QUESTIONS AROUND AND BALANCE IT OUT? SURE.

COUNCILMEMBER HINTON?

YEAH. I MEAN, I'M JUST TAKING THE INFORMATION IN. BUT MY RECOLLECTION IS WE WERE NEVER PROMISED BECAUSE IT'S CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION ABOUT PEOPLE WHO WERE SELECTED THAT WE COULD LIKE PICK WHO IS GOING TO MOVE INTO THIS COMMUNITY. SO I JUST WANT TO BE CLEAR FROM MY PERSPECTIVE. I DIDN'T FEEL LIKE THAT WAS -- WE'RE NOT HOLDING A TOWN HALL TO DECIDE LIKE GET FEEDBACK ON WHO IS ACCEPTED INTO THIS NEW COMMUNITY. I FEEL LIKE WE ARE TRUSTING OUR OPERATORS. SO I JUST WANTED TO PUT THAT OUT THERE AGAIN BECAUSE I NEVER HAD THAT EXPECTATION.

I THINK WE ALL HAVE A DIFFERENT PERSPECTIVE WITH THAT. [INAUDIBLE] I TOO HEARD THE SAME THING THAT WAS STATED EARLIER. IS THERE ANYONE ELSE? IT'S HARD TO SEE.

LAUREN FROM ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A REAL COMMENT BEFORE WE TAKE THE NEXT QUESTION.

YEAH. I MEAN, HONESTLY I HEAR YOUR CONCERN. AS I SAID, I WAS INVOLVED WITH A LOT OF THE CONCERNS HAPPENING AT ELDERBERRY, WHICH WERE VALID. I THINK OUR GOAL IS TO HELP PERSUADE ANY FEARS YOU HAVE OR APPREHENSIONS. I THINK THERE'S A LOT OF EXCITEMENT ABOUT THIS PATH FORWARD AND THE COMMUNITY ITSELF. AND I MEAN JUST BEING, NOT TO BE ADVERSARY, BUT THE LANDLORD NEXT DOOR DOESN'T

ASK ME MY OPINION ON WHO MOVES IN. SO I GUESS I'M JUST CURIOUS WHAT A COMMUNITY MEETING MIGHT ENTAIL OF WHAT YOU'D WANT TO WEIGH IN ON.

OKAY. COUNCILMEMBER CARTER? I CAN'T TELL. DO YOU HAVE YOUR HAND UP?

YEAH, I WANT TO KNOW HOW THE NEW EASES RESIDENTS, A, HOW IS THIS GOING TO BE DIFFERENT? BUT B, HOW THE NEW PEOPLE THAT ARE MOVING IN, WHICH IS A HARD ADJUSTMENT FEEL LIKE THEY'RE ALL A PART OF THIS COMMUNITY, YOU KNOW? SO THAT THEY OWN IT WHEN THEY GET HERE.

I LOVE THAT QUESTION. WE ARE LIKEWISE CONCERNED WITH THAT, RIGHT? OUR ULTIMATE GOAL IS PEOPLE NEED TO BE THERE AS LONG AS THEY NEED TO BE. BUT WE ALSO LIKE PEOPLE TO STABILIZE AND MOVE INTO MARKET RATE HOUSING, RIGHT? AND WHEREVER IT IS THEY WANT TO LIVE WITH WHOEVER THEY WANT TO LIVE WITH. ON SITE WILL HAVE A PROPERTY MANAGER AND A CASE MANAGER, SEVEN DAYS A WEEK. COTS ALSO EMPLOYEES BOTH THE ASSOCIATE SOCIAL WORKERS AND LICENSE CLINICAL SOCIAL WORKER WHO IS ARE AVAILABLE FOR ANYBODY IN ANY OF OUR HOUSING PROGRAMS. WE ALSO HAVE A REALLY EXPERIENCED BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PERSON THAT RUNS OUR RESIDENTS. HE'S OUR RESIDENCE SERVICE MANAGER, SO HE OVERSEES ANY PROJECTS THAT HAVE GENERALLY SPEAKING TEN UNITS OR MORE. SO WE WILL HAVE A LOT OF REALLY EXPERIENCED ON-SITE PEOPLE. LIKE I SAID, ESPECIALLY WITH THE FIRST TENANTS WHO ARE MOVING IN, THEY ALREADY HAVE REALLY STRONG ESTABLISHED RELATIONSHIPS WITH THEIR CASE MANAGERS, RIGHT? SO WE'RE NOT GOING TO BE -- ONE OF THE THINGS THAT'S REALLY HARD WHEN SOMEBODY MOVES INTO PSH IS NOT THAT THEY ARE JUST MOVING FROM HOMELESSNESS INTO HOUSING. IT IS ALSO THAT YOU HAVE TO ESTABLISH TRUST WITH THEM, RIGHT? IT IS REALLY HARD WHEN THEY MOVE FROM STREET HOMELESSNESS INTO HOUSING TO GET THEM TO OPEN THE DOOR AND ENGAGE WITH YOU. YOUR FIRST TENANTS AREN'T GOING TO HAVE THAT PROBLEM. THEY ALREADY KNOW US. THEY ALREADY TRUST US. THEY ARE SELECTING TO COME HERE, RIGHT? WE SENT OUT AN INTEREST LETTER TO ALL OF OUR TENANTS AND SAID, HEY, IF THIS COMES TO FRUITION, WHO IS INTERESTED IN LIVING IN SEBASTOPOL? THIS IS ALL ABOUT THE PROJECT, RIGHT? HERE IS WHAT IT IS. WHO WANTS TO GO THERE? WE HAD A LOT OF PEOPLE SAY, HEY, I WOULD LOVE THAT, RIGHT? I WOULD LOVE TO LIVE IN SEBASTOPOL. I WOULD LOVE TO HAVE MY OWN UNIT. I WANT TO MEET NEW PEOPLE AND LIVE AROUND PEOPLE WHO ARE LIKE ME, WHO WANT TO ENGAGE WITH ME, SOMEWHERE I COULD HAVE ACCESS TO A CASE MANAGER SEVEN DAYS A WEEK. SO WE HAVE ON-SITE PROGRAMMING. WE OFFER A, AA AND NA CLASSES AS PREDICTLY AS CLASSES THAT THEY NEED. WITHOUT GOING THROUGH THE COUNTY PROVIDER. HOPEFULLY THAT ANSWERS YOUR QUESTION. I'M HAPPY TO PROVIDE MORE INFORMATION.

COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN?

YEAH. SO THANK YOU, KRIS FOR BREAKING IT DOWN. SO WE'RE GOING TO GET MORE STABILIZED FOLKS THAN WHAT THE COUNTY PLACED AT ELDERBERRY, CORRECT? IS THAT A FAIR ASSESSMENT? WHEN I MEAN STABILIZE, I MEAN PEOPLE WHO ARE ALREADY ENGAGED WITH CASE MANAGER WHO HAVE WRAP-AROUND SERVICES? SO THEY'RE GOING TO BE A LITTLE BIT MORE -- THE SELECTION COMPLIANCE WITH TENANT REGULATION. IS THAT WHAT I'M GETTING FROM YOU? THE FIRST GROUP THAT ARE GOING TO BE MOVED IN ARE GOING TO BE STABILIZED COMING FROM OTHER LOCATIONS WITHIN THE COUNTY. IS THAT A FAIR ASSESSMENT?

YES, THEY ARE ALREADY ESTABLISHED TENANTS WITH US. THEY ALREADY KNOW US. THEY KNOW OUR STAFF AND WHAT IS EXPECTED IN HOUSING. THEY'RE ALREADY USED TO US. WE DO SUPER FREQUENT INSPECTIONS IN PSH. WE FOUND IT'S REALLY HELPFUL IN MAKING SURE PEOPLE MAINTAIN THE HEALTH AND SAFETY OF THEIR UNIT, SO THEY'RE USED TO THAT TOO. SO YEAH, I THINK THE FIRST TENANTS MOVING IN. THIS WOULD BE A FIRST FOR US, RIGHT? WE'VE NEVER DONE A BIG TRANSFER OF THIS MANY PEOPLE ALL AT ONCE. THE FIRST FOLKS MOVING IN WILL CERTAINLY BE -- I DON'T WANT TO SAY ANYTHING BAD ABOUT SOMEBODY MOVING FROM STREET HOMELESSNESS INTO HOUSING, BUT THEY WILL BE MORE USED TO LIVING IN HOUSING THAN SOMEBODY COMING FROM CHRONIC STREET HOMELESSNESS INTO PERMANENT HOUSING FOR THE FIRST TIME.

GETTING TO WHAT THE MAYOR WAS REFERENCING. THERE HAVE BEEN VARIOUS PROMISES ALONG THIS TRAJECTORY, MANY, MANY YEARS OF HAVING SOME OF OUR OWN

FOLKS WHO HAVE FALLEN ON HARD TIMES FROM THE RIVER, FROM SEBASTOPOL. MY UNDERSTANDING FROM HUNTER AND FROM NOLAN IS THEY'RE GOING TO BE SCREENED THROUGH LIKE THE BY NAMES COMMITTEE THAT HE'S SETTING UP IN SEPTEMBER. THAT'S GOING TO HELP POPULATE THE FOLKS COMING THROUGH COORDINATED ENTRY. IS THAT A FAIR ASSESSMENT?

YEAH, DEFINITELY. FIRST OF ALL, I JUST WANTED TO TOUCH BASE ON THE COMMENT YOU MADE JUST PREVIOUSLY. WHILE COTS HAS NOT HAD A BIG TRANSFER OF FOLKS FROM ONE PROPERTY TO THE OTHER COORDINATED ENTRY HAS FACILITATED THOSE TYPES OF TRANSFERS. ONE JUST SIX MONTHS AGO. SO WE ARE VERY WELL EQUIPPED TO ASSIST WITH THAT TYPE OF TRANSFER. IN TERMS OF THE WEST COUNTY BY NAMES LIST. IT IS FULLY UP TO COTS OF ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL TO MAKE THE ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA THAT'S ALLOWED PER FUNDING. A PART OF THAT CAN DEFINITELY BE THAT FOLKS NEED TO BE ON THE WEST COUNTY BY NAMES LIST IN ORDER TO QUALIFY FOR A REFERRAL IN THE FIRST PLACE. SO WE WOULDN'T EVEN REACH OUT TO FOLKS WHO ARE NOT ON THAT BY NAMES LIST TO ASK THEM IF THEY'RE INTERESTED, IF WE KNOW THEY'RE NOT ON THAT LIST BECAUSE WE WOULDN'T ASK FOLKS THAT DON'T QUALIFY IF THEY WANT TO GO TO A PROJECT.

AND IS THAT WHERE THE CITY STAFF WOULD BE ABLE TO SIT IN ON MEETINGS? I'VE ATTENDED MANY MEETINGS AT THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH FOR US ELECTED, WHO ARE TRYING TO SORT THROUGH THE ISSUES. IS THAT WHEN MY REPLACEMENT WOULD BE INVITED TO ONE OF THE BY NAMES LIST? AT LEAST AT THE VERY BEGINNING TO HEAR ABOUT THE GENERAL OVERVIEW OF WHO'S BEING CONTEMPLATED TO GO THROUGH THE SCREENING PROCESS, THE BY NAMES LIST. AND AT SOME POINT, WE WOULD BE EXCUSED AS WOULD LAW ENFORCEMENT. THEY WOULD BE EXCUSED, TO GET INTO THE REAL CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION THAT NOBODY SHOULD HAVE ACCESS TO EXCEPT FOR THE CLINICIAN. IS THAT A FAIR ASSESSMENT?

THE NAMES ITSELF IS PERSONAL IDENTIFIABLE INFORMATION. UNLESS YOU'RE ON THE RELEASE OF INFORMATION, YOU WOULD NOT BE ABLE TO KNOW WHO WE'RE TALKING ABOUT.

SO I GUESS THEN WHERE WOULD WE, AS ELECTED, WHERE WOULD MY NEXT LIAISON, THE NEXT PERSON WHO TAKES MY POSITION. WHAT EXPECTATIONS WOULD THEY HAVE TO BE PART OF THIS PROCESS? SHOULD WE JUST ASSUME NO ONE WILL HAVE THE ABILITY TO PARTICIPATE IN THE PROCESS?

IN TERMS OF SELECTING INDIVIDUAL HOUSEHOLDS TO MOVE IN, THAT WOULD BE INCREDIBLY UNUSUAL.

OKAY.

WE DON'T HAVE ANY OTHER PROJECTS THAT THE JURISDICTIONS THAT WOULD DO THAT. THAT WOULD BE VERY UNUSUAL.

THAT'S FAIR ENOUGH. SO AGAIN, I'M TRYING TO GET AN ANSWER TO WHERE WOULD WE HAVE WAY TO BE ABLE TO COME BACK TO COUNCIL MEETINGS AND DO A REPORT OUT OF ATTENDING A BY NAMES LIST, AND THIS IS WHAT I THINK WOULD BE HELPFUL FOR THE COMMUNITY TO KNOW WHEN AND HOW WOULD THAT HAPPEN?

YEAH. THOSE BY NAMES LIST MEETINGS, YOU WOULD HAVE TO TALK TO NOLAN AND HUNTER ABOUT THE DETAILS OF WHO GETS TO GO TO THOSE. BUT LIKE YOU HAD JUST ENVISIONED WHERE POLICE AND THE CITY COULD BE THERE AT THE BEGINNING OF THE MEETING BEFORE THEY GET INTO NAMES. THAT'S TYPICALLY HOW THE OTHER MEETINGS ARE RUN ACROSS THE COUNTY.

OKAY, WE'LL WAIT FOR HUNTER TO COME AND DO HIS PRESENTATION AND ASK ABOUT THE BY NAMES. BACK TO THE GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY. I'VE HEARD SOME INTREPIDATION.

WE HAVE ANOTHER COUNCIL MEMBER.

I'M SORRY.

WHO HAS MORE QUESTIONS. THEN I WANT TO GIVE ANOTHER --

SO SORRY. THANK YOU FOR DOING THAT. COUNCILMEMBER HINTON, GO AHEAD.

YEAH. I FEEL LIKE WE'RE KIND OF GOING DOWN THE RABBIT HOLE HERE. I KNOW THAT -- LET'S BE BLUNT. THIS IS A 3-2 VOTE. AND I NEVER FELT THERE WAS A PROMISE TO THIS COUNCIL THAT PEOPLE APPLYING FOR HOUSING WOULD EVER BE VETTED BY US, ELECTED OFFICIALS THAT ARE NOT AND SHOULD NOT, IN MY OPINION, BE IN THE ROOM. I

DO UNDERSTAND, AND I FELT LIKE THERE MIGHT BE -- WE MIGHT HAVE -- THEY KNEW WE WANTED A LOCAL PREFERENCE, IF THAT WAS POSSIBLE WHEN THEY LOOKED AT THE LIST OF EVERYONE THAT QUALIFIED. BUT I JUST, AGAIN, WE'VE HAD A PRESENTATION, AND I JUST WANT TO CALL IT OUT A BIT THAT I FEEL LIKE I DON'T WANT TO BE GRILLING OUR PARTNERS TONIGHT ON SOME OF THESE ISSUES. WE NEED TO HEAR FROM THE PUBLIC AS WELL, I BELIEVE. SO ANY WAY, I JUST -- I JUST NEED TO SAY THAT BECAUSE IT'S -- I'M JUST SITTING HERE LISTENING TO THIS, AND I WANT TO DEFINITELY HAVE MY VOICE HEARD AS WELL AS AN ELECTED OFFICIAL ON OUR COUNCIL, NOT JUST SOLELY FROM A SINGLE COUNCILMEMBER TONIGHT. I REALLY HAVEN'T HEARD FROM TWO OTHER PEOPLE ON THE DAIS.

DOES ANYONE ELSE HAVE ANYTHING ELSE TO SAY? I MEAN, WE'RE IN QUESTIONS RIGHT NOW. I DEFINITELY HAVE SOME COMMENTS. BUT DOES ANYONE HAVE ANY OTHER QUESTIONS?

GO AHEAD, COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN.

YES. SO BACK TO THE GOOD NEIGHBOR. THAT IS AGENDIZED. I UNDERSTOOD THE AGENDA REVIEW MADE THAT DECISION TO HAVE THAT COME OUT TONIGHT WHEN ALL THE PARTNERS WOULD BE IN THE ROOM. SO I WOULD REALLY LIKE TO HEAR WHAT RESERVATIONS YOU HAVE ABOUT ADOPTING THE GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY. FOR THE PUBLIC, I WANT TO MAKE IT CLEAR THAT IF WE DO PASS THAT TONIGHT, IT WOULD NOT BIND THESE FOLKS. IT WOULD NOT. THE SHIP HAS ALREADY SAILED FOR THEM. BUT I WOULD LIKE TO UNDERSTAND WHAT THEY HAVE CHALLENGES WITH, AND I'D LIKE TO HEAR THAT TONIGHT.

DO YOU WANT ME TO DO THAT NOW OR WHEN IT COMES UP LATER?

I'D LIKE TO HEAR IT NOW FROM YOUR PERSPECTIVE.

COULD WE ASK IF YOU WILL BE HERE FOR THAT ITEM? ARE YOU STAYING FOR THAT ITEM? BECAUSE WE DO REALLY WANT THAT.

I COULD STAY. YEAH. WE WOULD REALLY LIKE TO HEAR FROM YOU. IS THAT OKAY WITH YOU?

SURE.

YEAH, GREAT. THAT'S FINE.

OKAY. OTHER QUESTIONS? ANYONE? OKAY. BECAUSE IF NOT, THEN WE'RE GOING TO GO TO PUBLIC COMMENT.

THANK YOU, MAYOR. SO THIS IS PUBLIC COMMENT. YOU GUYS CAN GO AHEAD AND HAVE A SEAT.

I'M SORRY.

GO AHEAD, LAUREN. DO YOU A QUICK COMMENT TO ADD?

YEAH, JUST ONE MORE BENEFIT OF COTS OPERATING THAT WILL BE DIFFERENT THAN WHAT YOU SAW POTENTIALLY AT ELDERBERRY. COTS BEING OPERATOR OF BOTH PROPERTY MANAGEMENT AND SERVICE PROVISIONS. SO I THINK WHILE THERE WAS A GREAT RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN WEST COUNTY COMMUNITY SERVICES AND BURBANK ELDERBERRY, THAT IS NOTHING AGAINST EITHER OF THOSE ENTITIES. SOMETIMES THAT CAN CAUSE MORE TENSION. SO I THINK A STRENGTH OF THIS, WHAT WILL BE DIFFERENT GOING BACK TO YOUR QUESTION IS THAT COTS WILL BE OPERATING BOTH OF THOSE COMPONENTS. SO I JUST WANTED TO POINT THAT OUT AS A POTENTIAL DIFFERENCE AS WELL.

ALL RIGHT. ARE WE GOOD FOR PUBLIC COMMENT?

THANK YOU. THIS IS PUBLIC COMMENT ON THE INFORMATIONAL PRESENTATION ON ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL AND GRAVENSTEIN COMMONS. IF YOU'D LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT, IT'S A TWO-MINUTE TIME LIMIT. WE DO CHAMBERS FIRST, THEN GO OUT TO ZOOM. OLIVER?

THANK YOU. DID I HEAR CORRECTLY THERE'S A FINANCIAL SHORT AND THEREFORE ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL IS LIQUIDATING SOME OF THEIR EXISTING BUILDINGS? AND THEN THEY'RE MOVING TENANTS FROM THOSE BUILDINGS INTO THIS NEW DEVELOPMENT WHEN IT IS READY? IT WASN'T VERY CLEAR ON THAT. AND THEN SECONDLY, DID HE SHOW UP? NO? OKAY. YEAH. AND I GREATLY APPRECIATE COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN'S QUESTIONING BECAUSE THE DEVIL'S IN THE DETAIL WITH THIS. PERSONALLY AS A CITIZEN WOULD REALLY LIKE TO SEE A VERY DETAILED PROJECT PLAN. ALL THIS LOOSEY GOOSEY, STUFF DOESN'T FLY VERY WELL WITH ELDERBERRY COMMONS AND ALL THE

POLICE THAT TO HAPPEN AND SO ON. SO RESPECT TO COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN FOR ASKING PERTINENT QUESTIONS. THANK YOU.

THANK YOU, OLIVER. NEXT, I'LL GO OUT TO ZOOM. LEE, CAN YOU UNMUTE YOURSELF, PLEASE?

YES.

THANK YOU. CAN YOU STILL SEE THE TIMER?

I CAN.

GREAT. GO AHEAD, PLEASE.

UM -- COUNCILMEMBER HINTON SAID WE SHOULD JUST TRUST THE OPERATORS. GOING BACK IN THE HISTORY OF THIS, AND I CAN'T EVEN GET ALL IT THIS STRAIGHT IN MY HEAD AS SOME OF THE OTHER PEOPLE HAVE COMMENTED IN THEIR QUESTION. I'M VERY SURE THEY TOLD THUS WAS PLENTY OF MONEY FOR CONSTRUCTION, AND NOT TO WORRY. WE HEARD TONIGHT THERE IS NOT QUITE ENOUGH MONEY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION. THEY ARE GOING WITH THE BACKUP PLAN, WHICH IS TO BORROW MONEY. THAT WAS THE BACKUP PLAN BEHIND GRANTS FROM THE COUNTY, MONEY FROM THE ACTUAL GRANT, DONATIONS THAT THEY WERE GOING TO RECEIVE. THE CITY IS AT FINANCIAL RISK HERE. IF THERE IS NOT ENOUGH MONEY, AND THEY'RE NOW INTO A LOAN, THAT SORT OF SOUNDS LIKE THE RISK METER SHOULD BE TICKING UP QUITE A BIT ON THE PART OF THE CITY AS WE LOOK AT THIS. IT WAS ALSO PROMISED WE'RE GOING TO GET HOMELESS OFF THE STREETS OF SEBASTOPOL WITH THIS PROJECT. WE'D BE ABLE TO DESIGNATE SOME PEOPLE FROM SEBASTOPOL WHO ARE HOMELESS AND GET THEM OFF THE STREETS. WE WERE GOING TO HAVE A SAY OF WHO WOULD GO INTO THIS, THE CITY COULD PARTICIPATE IN THIS. NOW WE'RE HEARING THAT IS HIGHLY UNUSUAL. IT DOESN'T REALLY HAPPEN. I THINK I HAD A QUESTION IN MY MIND. WE ARE THE SPONSOR OF THIS, TOGETHER WITH ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL. WE HAVE EXACTLY THE SAME STANDING, SORT TO SPEAK IN THIS, AS THEY DO. IF THEY'RE IN MEETINGS, SHOULDN'T WE BE IN THE MEETINGS? LASTLY, STAFF AT THE TIME RECOMMENDED AGAINST THIS IN LARGE PART BECAUSE WE DON'T HAVE PEOPLE ON STAFF THAT KNOW ANYTHING ABOUT THIS, AND WE DON'T HAVE THE CAPACITY TO DO THIS WITH THE STAFF THAT WE HAVE. BUT THE COUNCIL, THREE MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL PUSHED IT FORWARD, AND NOW THE CITY STAFF IS STUCK WITH IT. I GUESS MY QUESTION WOULD BE NOW THAT THIS IS AN ONGOING THING THAT THEY ARE OFFERING TO WORK VERY CLOSELY WITH THE CITY STAFF. WHO ON THE CITY STAFF WILL THEY WORK WITH? WHO HAS THE CAPACITY? WHO HAS THE KNOWLEDGE TO BE ABLE TO WORK ON THIS PROJECT? ON BEHALF OF THE CITY AND MAKE SURE THIS WORKS WELL? LASTLY --

LEE, THAT'S TWO MINUTES.

THANK YOU.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT I'LL COME BACK INTO CHAMBERS. IF THERE IS ANYONE IN CHAMBERS THAT WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT? PLEASE, COME UP TO THE PODIUM. SORRY, I'LL COME BACK. THAT'S OKAY. GO AHEAD.

HI, I'M KATHLEEN RUE. BUT I LIVE HERE IN SEBASTOPOL. I'M NOT SPEAKING AS AN OFFICIAL OF OF ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL. I'D EXCITED THAT COTS IS WILLING TO BE A PARTNER WITH ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL BECAUSE OF THE EXPERIENCE THAT THEY HAVE AND THAT IS WHAT WE DIDN'T HAVE WHEN WE STARTED THE COMMONS IN SANTA ROSA. I THINK IT IS A REALLY GOOD STEP. THERE'S A MAN I'VE GOTTEN TO DEVELOP A RELATIONSHIP WITH WHO IS UNHOUSED, AND HE IS HERE IN SEBASTOPOL. HE SAID HE HAS A SOCIAL WORKER. HE'S INTERESTED IN GETTING INTO THE NEW HOUSING. SO I AM HOPING LIKE SOME OF YOU THAT THERE ARE OPPORTUNITIES FOR THE FOLKS IN SEBASTOPOL WHO ARE EXPRESSING AN INTEREST TO GET INTO THE HOUSING. MY LAST THING IS I'M REALLY PUSHING FOR GOOD SECURITY AND A HOUSE MANAGER THAT REALLY STEPS UP FOR THE NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY, EVEN IN THE MIDDLE OF THE NIGHT. SO YEAH. THANKS, YOU GUYS FOR BEING HERE.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. I'LL GO OUT TO ZOOM. KYLE, CAN YOU UNMUTE YOURSELF, PLEASE?

I CAN.

THANK YOU. CAN YOU SEE THE TIMER?

NO, BUT YOU CAN LET ME KNOW.

OKAY, GO AHEAD, PLEASE.

I DON'T MIND DOING THE RESEARCH FOR YOU, BUT I WOULD HOPE COUNCILMEMBERS ACTUALLY COME PREPARED. BUT MAYBE PEOPLE ARE TRYING TO MISREPRESENT THE PAST. SO LET'S RETURN WITH WHAT THE PUBLIC AND COUNCIL WERE TOLD WHEN GRAVENSTEIN COMMONS WAS FIRST APPROVED IN MAY 2023. ON MAY 16, STAFF REPORT STATED, AND I QUOTE, THE HOMES WILL BE DEDICATED TO HOUSING THE HOUSELESS OF SEBASTOPOL. THIS WASN'T A VAGUE STATEMENT THAT THE PROJECT WOULD MERELY BE LOCATED IN SEBASTOPOL. IT DESCRIBES WHO THE PROJECT WAS INTENDED TO SERVE. THE REPORT CONNECTED GRAVENSTEIN COMMONS DIRECTLY TO THE PEOPLE DISPLACED FROM MORRIS STREET. THE CITY'S RESPONSE TO LOCAL HOMELESSNESS. THE PROJECT HAS CHANGED SUBSTANTIALLY. ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL, NO LONGER EXPECTED TO OPERATE IT. COTS IS INVOLVED. THERE'S UNCERTAINTY HOW RESIDENTS WILL BE SELECTED. THE STATE AGREEMENT REQUIRES REFERRALS THROUGH COORDINATED ENTRY, BUT IT DOES NOT ANSWER WHETHER THE ORIGINAL COMMITMENT TO SEBASTOPOL'S UNHOUSED POPULATION REMAINS IN EFFECT, INCLUDING THE LATER REPORTED COMMITMENT OF EIGHT UNITS FOR FORMER HORIZON SHINE RESIDENTS. THE PUBLICLY APPROVAL DOCUMENTS DOES NOT GIVE THE CITY THE AUTHORITY TO APPROVE. PROVIDING OVERSIGHT, FINANCES, PROJECT MANAGEMENT, REPORTING, AND REGULATORY COMPLIANCE. THIS IS NOT THE SAME AS OVERSIGHT OF THE TENANT SELECTION POLICY. SO I'M ASKING THE COUNCIL TO ANSWER THESE THREE QUESTIONS. FIRST, DOES THE ORIGINAL PROMISE THAT THESE HOMES WOULD BE DEDICATED TO SEBASTOPOL'S UNHOUSED POPULATION REMAIN OPERATIVE? SECOND, WHAT WRITTEN AGREEMENT BINDS COTS TO THAT PROMISE AND TO THE EIGHT-UNIT COMMITMENT? THIRD, WILL THE CITY REQUIRE THE TENANT SELECTION PLAN ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA AND REFERRAL PROCESS TO PRESENT, TO BE PRESENTED PUBLICLY BEFORE LEASE UP BEGINS? THIS ISN'T ABOUT CHOOSING INDIVIDUAL TENANTS. IT'S ABOUT ENSURING A PROJECT APPROVED ON ONE PUBLIC UNDERSTANDING IS NOT QUIETLY OPERATED UNDER A MATERIALLY DIFFERENT ONE.

KYLE, YOU'VE GOT TEN SECONDS.

THAT IS SO FAMILIAR.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT, I'LL COME BACK INTO CHAMBERS. IF THERE IS ANYONE IN CHAMBERS. PLEASE?

THANK YOU, COTS, THANK YOU, COUNCIL. WHEN WE COME TO THE GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY, I'D REALLY LIKE TO KNOW WHAT THE OPPORTUNITIES FOR TENANT INVOLVEMENT. BECAUSE WHEN WE TALK ABOUT THE GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY. I WANT TO KNOW WHAT INPUT THE TENANTS CAN HAVE. I APPRECIATE THE LESSONS LEARNED AND THE MISTAKES MADE FROM THE PAST. BUT I WANT TO KNOW GOING FORWARD, WHAT MODELS CAN BE SUCCESSFUL IT IN TERMS OF TENANT PARTICIPATION? THANK YOU.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT, I'LL GO BACK OUT TO ZOOM. IF THERE IS ANYONE ON ZOOM THAT WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT ON THIS INFORMATIONAL PRESENTATION FROM GRAVENSTEIN COMMONS? SEEING NONE. I'LL COME BACK INTO CHAMBERS. IF ANYONE IN CHAMBERS WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT? SEEING NONE. PUBLIC COMMENT IS CLOSED ON THIS ITEM.

OKAY. THANK YOU. WE'RE BACK AT THE DAIS FOR COUNCIL COMMENTS. IF ANYONE WANTS TO GO FIRST? VICE MAYOR?

YES. I'D JUST LIKE TO THANK ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL DIRECTOR AND THE COTS GROUP FOR YOUR ENGAGEMENT WITH EACH OTHER. I'M REALLY EXCITED. I THINK THE EXPERIENCE IS JUST OOZING OUT OF COTS, SO I'M REALLY, REALLY GRATEFUL FOR THAT PARTNERSHIP. THANK YOU FOR BEING HERE TO PRESENT TO US TONIGHT, AND BEARING WITH THE QUESTIONS AND THE CONCERNS OF THE RESIDENTS AS WELL. THANK YOU.

OKAY. ANYONE ELSE? AM I MISSING ANYONE? OKAY.

I'M NOT SEEING ANYONE IN CHAMBERS.

I'M SORRY, COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN HAS HIS HAND UP.

NO, IT SOUNDS LIKE I WAS TALKING TOO MUCH. I WAS EXPECTING SOMEONE ELSE TO CHIME IN. NO ONE ELSE IS CHIMING IN.

I WILL AFTER YOU'RE FINISHED, SO GO AHEAD.

YEAH, BUT NO. I MEAN, I WAS VERY PLEASANTLY SURPRISED, SHOCKED, BUT PLEASANTLY SURPRISED THAT COTS WAS SELECTED AS THE OPERATOR. I DO HAVE A LOT

OF CONFIDENCE IN KRIS, IN PARTICULAR, AND COTS BECAUSE KRIS IS BORN WITH ME AFTER THE WHOLE FALLOUT AT ELDERBERRY, MANY, MANY COFFEES, MANY, MANY DISCUSSIONS ABOUT THE FACT THESE PEOPLE ARE VULNERABLE. I WISH THEY WERE ALL OFF ON OUR STREET OR ONE OF OUR OWN THAT HAS FALLEN ON HARD TIME. BUT THAT WAS NOT THE REPRESENTATION EARLY ON BY ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL. I'LL BE VERY CLEAR ABOUT THAT. THEY DID MAKE PROMISES, AND IT'S NOT IN ACCORDANCE WITH STATE LAW, AND HUNTER'S BACK THERE, AND HE'S GOING TO TALK ABOUT THE FACT THAT NONE OF THAT MADE ANY SENSE. THE FACT YOU CAN'T PROMISE ANYTHING THAT VIOLATES STATE LAW. STATE LAW REQUIRES THEM TO GO THROUGH COORDINATED ENTRY. BY NAMES LIST, ALL OF THAT. SO I'M REALLY SORRY BECAUSE ONE OPERATOR COULDN'T GET IT TOGETHER THAT THIS COMMUNITY WENT THROUGH THE STRESS THAT IT DID. BUT NOW WE DO HAVE PEOPLE THAT ARE CLEAR ON THE STATE REQUIREMENTS. WE HAVE HUNTER. NOW WE HAVE KRIS, AND KRIS, I THINK WILL BE VERY ACCESSIBLE WHEN SHE SAYS SHE IS, SHE WILL BE. SO MARY, I THINK WILL BE ABLE TO HAVE CONFIDENCE THAT WHEN SHE GETS MULTIPLE COMPLAINTS, NOT EVEN COMPLAINTS, BUT CONCERNS FROM RESIDENTS ABOUT WHAT IS GOING ON. I SAW A MOVING TRUCK. I KNOW, NOBODY REALLY WANTS TO FEEL, I THINK IN THIS COMMUNITY THAT WE WANT TO SELECT PEOPLE. I THINK WE WANT TO BE INVOLVED AND CARE FOR THEM THE BEST WAY THAT WE CAN, RESPECTING THEIR CONFIDENTIALITY RIGHTS, RIGHT? WE WANT THEM TO BE SUCCESSFUL. JUST LIKE THE PEOPLE FROM HABITAT. WE WANT THEM TO FEEL PART OF THIS COMMUNITY, RIGHT? BUT THERE IS THAT RESIDUAL CONCERN THAT WE'VE BEEN PLACED IN SITUATIONS THAT HAVE NOT BEEN GREAT, NOT BEEN GREAT FOR THE COMMUNITY, AND CERTAINLY NOT GREAT FOR ANY OF US SITTING UP HERE, RIGHT? SO I AM THRILLED THAT KRIS IS TAKING OVER, COTS IS TAKING OVER, AND I DO REALLY FEEL HOPEFUL OVERALL WITH THIS PROJECT. I THINK THE REST OF IT, AS FAR AS THE TIMELINE, I REALLY AM HOPING THAT WHEN HUNTER COMES UP, HE'LL BE ABLE TO TALK ABOUT WHEN THE COMMUNITY MEETINGS WILL TAKE PLACE. WHEN THE BY NAMES LIST WILL ACTUALLY START HAPPENING IN THOSE MEETINGS. SO WHETHER IT IS ME OR WHOEVER TAKES MY POSITION WILL KNOW AS AN ELECTED OFFICIAL, WHERE ARE WE INVITED TO? WHAT MEETINGS ARE WE INVITED TO? WHAT MEETINGS ARE WE NOT INVITED TO, SO WE CAN EXPLAIN TO THE PUBLIC. WE CAN ACTUALLY LISTEN AND TRY TO IMPLEMENT YOUR CONCERNS. SO THOSE ARE MY COMMENTS, AND I AM THRILLED. I'M REALLY VERY RELIEVED. WHEN I READ THIS, THIS IS THE FIRST TIME I HEARD THEY WERE TAKING OVER. SO IT IS WEIRD IN AND OF ITSELF. BUT NONETHELESS, I AM DELIGHTED, SO I'LL LEAVE IT AT THAT.

ANYONE ELSE? OKAY. I HAVE SOME COMMENTS TO MAKE JUST REGARDING SOME OTHER COMMENTS THAT WERE MADE EARLIER. SO, YOU KNOW, THIS HAS BEEN A LONG PROCESS. IT WAS A DIVIDED COUNCIL ON THIS. WE DID HAVE -- WE HAVE HAD A BAD EXPERIENCE WITH WHAT HAPPENED IN ELDERBERRY COMMONS. WHEN YOU SPEAK ABOUT, YOU KNOW, NEIGHBORS. ELDERBERRY COMMONS IS MY NEIGHBOR. IT'S RIGHT IN THE SAME PARKING LOT. SO I HAVE HAD FRONT ROW SEAT TO WHAT HAS GONE ON THERE. WHEN YOU ASK ABOUT WHAT I'M TALKING ABOUT. WE'RE WORRIED ABOUT PEOPLE LYING AROUND. THAT'S BECAUSE A WOMAN HAS LAID IN THE PARKING LOT AND IN THE SIDEWALK FOR DAYS ON END, AND THE PEOPLE WHO MANAGE THAT PROPERTY SAYS IT IS NOT THEIR PROBLEM. WE SHOULD NOT TREAT HUMANS LIKE THAT. EVERYONE ELSE IS CALLING, TRYING TO TAKE CARE OF IT. BUT THE PEOPLE WHO WERE RUNNING THAT SITE WERE NOT TAKING CARE OF THOSE PEOPLE, AND THAT IS NOT HOW WE SHOULD TREAT PEOPLE. ALL THE QUESTIONS THAT ARE COMING ARE NOT UNFOUNDED. IT'S BECAUSE OF CONCERN BECAUSE OF THE EXPERIENCE THAT WE'VE HAD. IT'S NOT BECAUSE WE'RE TRYING TO BE ANYTHING, IT'S JUST BASED ON THE EXPERIENCE WE HAD. AND NOT EVERYONE IN THIS ROOM HAS BEEN, YOU KNOW, PART OF ALL OF THIS. AND WE RECEIVE A LOT OF COMMUNICATION. I PERSONALLY HAVE SPENT A GREAT DEAL OF TIME DEALING WITH THE ELDERBERRY COMMON ISSUES. SO I THINK ALL OF THESE ARE FOUNDED, AND I KNOW WE'RE DIVIDED, AND WE HAVE SOME OF US WHO HAVE GREAT QUESTIONS, A GREAT AMOUNT OF QUESTIONS, AND I THINK WE ALL JUST DESERVE TO HAVE THAT VOICE. BECAUSE WE DON'T ALL AGREE ON THIS. WHILE, YOU KNOW, THE DECISION WAS MADE, WE ALSO LIVE IN THIS COMMUNITY, AND WE'RE ELECTED TO ASK THESE QUESTIONS. AND TO TRY TO PROTECT THE PEOPLE IN THIS COMMUNITY AND MAKE

CERTAIN THAT, YOU KNOW, THE PEOPLE THAT YOU'RE BRINGING THERE ARE GOING TO BE TAKEN CARE OF BECAUSE THAT'S NOT WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING AT ELDERBERRY COMMONS ALL THE TIME. AND SO I JUST WANTED TO SAY THAT IS WHERE THIS IS COMING FROM. PEOPLE DO NEED TO BE TREATED APPROPRIATELY. AND I DON'T KNOW, I'M JUST GOING TO SAY I DON'T HAVE ANY EXPERIENCE WITH COTS. FOR ME, IT IS TRUST, BUT VERIFY. AND FOR THE FUTURE, I LOOK FORWARD TO HEARING THE REPORTS ABOUT HOW THIS IS GOING. I DO NOT LIVE IN THAT PARKING LOT LIKE I DO WITH THE OTHER PIECE. AND I ALSO JUST WANTED TO MENTION THAT A FEW MEETINGS AGO, WE HAD A REPORT FROM THE POLICE CHIEF THAT AGAIN, ELDERBERRY COMMONS. 1% OF OUR POPULATION IS UTILIZING 25% OF OUR POLICE FORCE TIME. SO IT IS A VERY REAL CONCERN FOR OUR COMMUNITY, AND WE HAVE A VERY SMALL BUDGET, AND WE'RE VERY, YOU KNOW, WE'RE CONSTANTLY TIGHT WITH THAT. WE'VE HAD A FISCAL EMERGENCY. SO I JUST WANTED TO SAY ALL OF THIS IS COMING FROM A PLACE OF WE ARE ALL ELECTED TO ASK THESE QUESTIONS. SO THANK YOU ALL FOR DOING THE PRESENTATION. IS THERE ANYONE ELSE? I DON'T SEE ANYONE ELSE FROM MY SCREEN. MARY?

NO. THERE'S NO WIN ELSE ON COUNCIL. SO THIS WILL CONCLUDE THE PRESENTATION FROM ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL AND COTS, AND ROBIN. WE CAN GO ONTO OUR NEXT ITEM. PERFECT. SORRY. I CAN'T SEE EVERYTHING. IT'S A LITTLE BLURRY ON THE SCREEN. ALL RIGHT, WE'LL MOVE ONTO ITEM NUMBER NINE, WHICH IS OUR PUBLIC HEARINGS. WE'RE GOING TO GO CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL OF THE GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY.

GUIDELINES DESIGNED TO BALANCE DEVELOPMENT, BUSINESS OPERATIONS, AND SOCIAL SERVICES WITH THE QUALITY OF LIFE IN SURROUNDING RESIDENTIAL AREAS. THEY ADDRESS NUANCES LIKE NOISE, TRASH, AND TRAFFIC, OFTEN REQUIRING BUSINESSES OR SERVICE PROVIDERS TO IMPLEMENT SECURITY, CONTACT LINES, AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT TO FOSTER ACCOUNTABILITY AND REDUCE CONFLICT. THE PROPOSED COUNTY STANDARDS ARE DUE TO BE APPROVED AFTER ONE MORE REVIEW. AND I THINK WHO IS DOING THIS? IT IS OUR CITY ATTORNEY.

YES, MAYOR. I CAN.

I'M SORRY, I CAN'T SEE YOU.

NO PROBLEM. GOOD EVENING, COUNCIL. SO AS MAYOR MENTIONED TO YOU TONIGHT, IT'S AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH A GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY FOR OUR NEW AND FUTURE CITY SPONSORED HOUSING THE COUNTY HOMELESS COALITION WAS WORKING ON BROADER STANDARDS FOR SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FACILITIES. SO WE PAUSE THAT TO SEE WHAT THEY WOULD BE COMING UP WITH. THEY HAVE DRAFT POLICIES THAT HAVE BEEN PREPARED. I WOULD SAY THOSE ARE MUCH BROADER AND COVER MUCH MORE ISSUES THAN JUST SORT OF GOOD NEIGHBORS THAT ALSO DEAL WITH SORT OF THE WHOLE OPERATION OF PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING FACILITY. THIS IS REALLY JUST FOCUSED ON THE INTERACTION WITH THE OUTSIDE COMMUNITY. YOU'VE HEARD TONIGHT AND OTHER ITEMS ABOUT HOW DO WE DEAL WITH INTERNALLY WITH RESIDENTS AND HEARING THEIR COMPLAINTS. YOU KNOW, RESIDENTS ARE TENANTS AT THE FACILITY. THIS POLICY DOESN'T DEAL WITH THAT. THIS IS JUST ABOUT EXPECTATIONS FOR INTERNAL, EXCUSE ME, EXTERNAL SORT OF OPERATIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS. IT APPLIES TO NEW CITY SPONSORED HOUSING PROJECTS. SO A PROJECT IS CITY SPONSORED AND IF WE ARE CO-APPLICANT FOR SOMETHING LIKE WE ARE, LIKE WE WERE WITH GRAVENSTEIN COMMONS. WE WOULD REQUIRE THAT THEY AGREE TO THIS AS A CONDITION OF US BEING A COAPPLICANT. SIMILARLY IF EVER IN THE FUTURE WE DECIDE TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO A PROJECT, YOU KNOW, WE WILL BE REQUIRING THEM AS A CONDITION OF TAKING OUR FUNDING, AGREEING TO THESE POLICIES. AND THERE MAY BE SOME OTHER SITUATIONS WHERE WE CAN IMPOSE IT. LIKE IF THERE IS A REQUEST FOR ZONING CHANGE OR SOMETHING TO ALLOW THAT. BUT OTHERWISE WE DON'T HAVE THE ABILITY TO IMPOSE THESE REQUIREMENTS OR PROJECTS, OR AT LEAST THE FULL RANGE OF PROJECTS. THAT'S OUTSIDE THE SCOPE OF OUR LAND USE AUTHORITY, WHICH AMONG OTHER THINGS REQUIRES US TO TREAT THESE PROJECTS THE SAME AS PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING PROJECT, THE SAME AS ANY MULTI-FAMILY RESIDENTIAL PROJECT. SO WE CAN IMPOSE ADDITIONAL STANDARDS ON THAT. AND WE CAN'T REQUIRE MUCH OF WHAT WE WERE REQUIRING HERE FOR JUST A RUN OF THE MILL MULTI-FAMILY HOUSING PROJECT. THERE ARE SOME HERE THAT WE COULD PROBABLY REQUIRE ANY PROJECT TO DO, YOU KNOW, POST A

POINT OF CONTACT, YOU KNOW, ON SITE. WE COULD PROBABLY REQUIRE THE MULTI-FAMILY HOUSING TO DO THAT AS WELL. BUT THIS HAS OTHER REQUIREMENTS IN IT AS WELL. SO IT REQUIRES SOME COMMUNITY MEETINGS DURING THE DEVELOPMENT STAGE AND DURING ACTIVITIES. IT REQUIRES -- EXCUSE ME, THE HOUSING PROVIDERS TO, YOU KNOW, HAVE RULES THEY REQUIRE THE TENANTS TO SIGN THAT. THAT IS VERY COMMON REGARDLESS OF WHETHER IT IS IN AN ORDINANCE OR NOT, AND TO DO AN ORIENTATION ABOUT THOSE RULES WITH TENANTS. BUT THE MORE DETAILED REQUIREMENTS WILL COME LATER ABOUT THE OPERATION. THE NEIGHBORHOOD PATROLS, HAVING THEM PATROL THE NEIGHBORHOOD TO, YOU KNOW, FIND RESIDENTS THAT MAY BE OBSTRUCTING SIDEWALKS OR, YOU KNOW, ENGAGING IN BEHAVIORS THAT ARE PROBLEMATIC OR ENCOURAGING THEM TO STOP OR COME BACK TO THE FACILITY. AND, YOU KNOW, MAKING SURE THEY ARE ALSO MAKING SURE THE PROJECT WILL BE KEPT CLEAN. AND THEN THERE IS ALSO SOME REQUIREMENTS ABOUT COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, MAINTAINING CONTACT, PHONE NUMBER, E-MAIL, THAT'S AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC. ACKNOWLEDGING WHEN COMPLAINTS ARE RECEIVED. PROVIDING, YOU KNOW, SORT OF DOCUMENTATION AND RECORDKEEPING ABOUT HOW COMPLAINTS ARE HANDLED IF THEY WERE ABLE TO BE ADDRESSED OR NOT. MAKING IT AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC. AND THEN MAKE IT, YOU KNOW, EXCUSE ME, NOT AVAILABLE TO THE PUBLIC, BUT WITH AVAILABLE TO THE CITY UPON REQUEST. THESE STANDARDS ARE A MIX OF WHAT CATHOLIC CHARITIES. IT'S A LITTLE BIT OF WHAT CATHOLIC CHARITIES HAS FOR THEIR RULES IN SANTA ROSA. THOSE WERE PRETTY GENERAL. SO IN LOOKING FOR MORE SPECIFIC STANDARDS, SAN FRANCISCO HAS RECENTLY PUT FORWARD SIMILAR GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICIES FOR SOME OF ITS PROJECTS. SOME WILL RECEIVE FUNDING FROM THE CITY, AND IN THAT CASE, IT IS MOSTLY SHELTERS, NOT PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING. WE USE THAT FOR A BASIS. BUT IT IS REALLY UP TO THE COUNCIL AND WHAT THEY WANT TO INCLUDE. THINGS, OF COURSE, I KNOW I HEARD FROM ONE COUNCIL MEMBER ABOUT CHANGES THEY'D LIKE TO MAKE, AND THAT IS ENTIRELY UP TO THE COUNCIL. SO WITH THAT, I'LL PAUSE FOR ANY QUESTIONS THAT COUNCIL MAY HAVE.

GO AHEAD COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN?

YEAH. FIRST, THANKS FOR PUTTING THE STAFF REPORT. THANKS FOR REFERENCING WHERE THIS IDEA CAME FROM FROM CATHOLIC CHARITIES. WHEN EVERYTHING HAPPENED WITH ELDERBERRY COMMONS, IT WAS THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF CATHOLIC CHARITIES THROUGH ONE OF THE ELECTIVE MEETINGS TO JUST SAY, YOU KNOW, SORRY THAT ALL HAPPENED. BUT MOVING FORWARD, YOU COULD DO X. SO I JUST WANT TO GIVE A SHOUT OUT TO HER AND TO AT LEAST HAVING SOMETHING WE COULD MODEL AFTER. I THINK INCORPORATING THINGS FROM OTHER THAN MUNICIPALITIES. SAN FRANCISCO WAS A GOOD THING. YOU REFERENCE THE COUNTY'S EFFORT AS A RESULT OF OUR CHALLENGES WITH ELDERBERRY. COORDINATED ENTRY REQUESTED THERE BE A PROVIDER MEETING TO DEVELOP PERMANENT SUPPORTING HOUSING. I'VE BEEN ATTENDING THEM EVERY MONTH, AS IS ROBIN, WHO IS OUR CONSULTANT. AND TODAY WAS THE FINAL MEETING. ROBIN ATTENDED, AND SHE CAN CORRECT ME IF I'M WRONG. BUT THERE WERE NO FURTHER ADDITIONAL COMMENTS. LIKE IT'S DOING AND NOW IT'S GOING TO GO TO THE HOUSING COALITION BOARD. THAT'S WHERE THINGS ARE. SO I WANTED TO INFORM THE PUCK LICK THERE WILL NOW BE COUNTY GUIDELINES ABOUT HOW THINGS ARE TO FORWARD FOR. IN THE CITY, IN THE COUNTY. BUT IF WE'RE GOING TO GET INTO QUESTIONS NOW, I WANT TO GET BACK TO THE GOOD NEIGHBOR BECAUSE WHAT ROBIN DID, SHE TOOK A LOT OF TIME AND EFFORT TO REVIEW ALL OF THE 25 PAGES. AND NOW I HAVE CONCERNS THAT IT APPEARS THE REPRESENTATIVE FROM ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL, WHEN SHE SPOKE EARLIER, HAS CONCERNS ABOUT THE GOOD NEIGHBOR. SO I WANT TO HEAR DIRECTLY FROM BOTH OF THEM ABOUT WHERE WE ARE WITH ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL'S MEALING ABOUT THIS. EVEN THOUGH WE CAN'T BIND YOU TO IT, I WANT TO KNOW WHAT YOUR CONCERNS ARE. THE PUBLIC HAS A RIGHT TO RELY ON YOU HAVE A GOOD NEIGHBORHOOD. WHY IS THAT OPERATIONS NOT MOVING IN COORDINATION WITH WHAT YOU MISSED? I WILL LEAVE IT OVER TO WHOEVER WANTS TO ANSWER THAT.

WELL, ALEX. HOW DO WE DO THIS WITH PROPER --

SO YOU CAN HAVE THEM UP AND ANSWER THAT QUESTION OUTSIDE OF PUBLIC COMMENT.

OKAY, THAT'S WHAT I WAS WONDERING. I KNOW VICE MAYOR HAS A QUESTION TOO, SO I DON'T KNOW IF THAT'S RELATED?

GO AHEAD. SO WHICH COMMUNITY STAKEHOLDERS HAVE WEIGHED IN ON THE GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY? HAVE ANY TAKE HOLDERS TALK ABOUT IT?

NONE.

THE NEXT QUESTION, IF THERE ARE COUNTY GUIDELINES BEING DEVELOPED. WHY DO WE NEED THIS?

SO THAT IS WHY WE WAITED TO SEE THE COUNTY GUIDELINES ARE NOT THIS DETAILED. THEY ARE MUCH BROADER, AND ARE -- I DON'T WANT TO SAY VAGUE. IF YOU LOOK AT OUR GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY. THE LANGUAGE ABOUT DEVELOPMENT STAGE AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT, THAT IS VERY SIMILAR TO WHAT IS IN THE COUNTY GUIDELINE. SO YOU KNOW IT'S A LITTLE VAGUE IN TALKING. THERE ARE REAL THINGS IN THERE, BUT SORT OF THE EXPECTATION THAT YOU WILL PATROL THREE TIMES A DAY LIKE VERY SPECIFIC THINGS THAT ARE NOT IN THOSE GUIDELINES. SO THAT'S WHY WE PUT THE LIST TOGETHER, BASED ON THE PRIOR DIRECTION FROM COUNCIL.

I HAVE ONE MORE QUESTION. AND THIS IS SENT TO ME BY A RESIDENT THAT THE DETAILS IN THE GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY ARE KIND OF LOOKS LIKE HEIGHTENED SURVEILLANCE OF A PARTICULAR CLASS OF RESIDENTS. I'M WONDERING WHAT DO YOU SAY TO THAT?

I WOULDN'T SAY IT'S A SURVEILLANCE OF THE RESIDENTS AT ALL. I THINK IT'S EXPECTATIONS FOR THE HOUSING PROVIDERS ABOUT HOW THEY WILL OPERATE WITH REGARDS TO THE COMMUNITY. THERE IS NOTHING IN HERE ABOUT THEM HAVING TO TRACK WHERE, YOU KNOW, WHAT RESIDENTS ARE DOING 24/7. IT'S ABOUT SORT OF EXPECTATIONS, IF THE CITY DECIDES TO MOVE FORWARD. EXPECTATIONS ABOUT HOW, YOU KNOW, OPERATORS WILL ENGAGE WITH THEM, THE BROADER COMMUNITY, ESPECIALLY IN THE IMMEDIATE VICINITY.

THANK YOU. IS THERE ANYONE ELSE WITH QUESTIONS? COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN, YOU HAD QUESTIONS FROM ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL, IS THAT WHO YOU SAID?

YEAH. WHOEVER WANTS TO RESPOND. BECAUSE AGAIN, MY FEELING WAS MAYBE I MISINTERPRETED WHEN I BROUGHT UP THE GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY FROM I THINK THE NEW EXECUTIVE ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL. MY SENSE WAS THERE WERE OBJECTIONS. AND IF THERE ARE OBJECTIONS TO WHAT IT IS THAT WE MAY OR MAY NOT PASS, I WOULD LIKE TO HEAR THEM. I THINK THE PUBLIC WOULD ALSO LIKE TO HEAR THEM. SO PLEASE?

YEAH. I MEAN, I DIDN'T COME THROUGH THIS WITH A FINE TOOTH COMB, BUT I UNDERSTAND THE INTENT OF IT. AND I JUST DON'T FEEL LIKE IT IS IN MY PLACE, SINCE WE'RE NOT GOING TO BE OPERATING TO THE SITE TO RESPOND TO IT. I MEAN, I THINK MOST OF WHAT IS OUTLINED IS REASONABLE. I THINK WHAT STOOD OUT TO ME IS IF WE WERE PROPERTY MANAGING THE SITE, IT MIGHT BE THERE'S A COUPLE OF POINTS THAT WILL STAND OUT TO ME AS, YOU KNOW, ASKING A BIT MUCH OF THE PROVIDER. BUT I'LL LET CHRIS RESPOND.

BEFORE YOU MOVE ON. CAN YOU SPECIFY WHAT THOSE THINGS ARE?

I THINK JUST AROUND, YOU KNOW, MONITORING THE MULTIPLE -- WALKING THE PROPERTY AND THE ROUNDS THAT WERE OUTLINED IN THERE. I THINK THE SPECIFICATION OF NIGHTTIME?

YEAH.

AND I THINK IT CALLED OUT SPECIFIC QUANTITIES TWICE A DAY, DAYTIME AND NIGHTTIME. I MEAN THE PROPERTY ITSELF, BUT NOT LIKE THE SURROUNDING NEIGHBORHOOD JUST SEEMS A BIT EXCESSIVE.

HELLO. ME AGAIN. ATTORNEY BY TRAINING. SO EVERYTHING SEEMS VAGUE TO ME. SO I'LL GIVE YOU A COUPLE OF POINTS THAT I'M LIKE EITHER I'M NOT SURE WHAT THAT MEANS OR NO, THAT'S TOO MUCH. AND I, LIKE LAUREN, I TOTALLY UNDERSTAND THE INTENT OF THIS POLICY. I SHARE SOME OF THE SAME CONCERNS WITH COUNCILMEMBER MAURER THAT THIS DOES SEEM RELATIVELY TARGETED, RIGHT, TO PSH DEVELOPMENTS. I UNDERSTAND MAYBE IT'S NOT SPELLED OUT AS THE INTENT, BUT THAT'S THE INTENT. IT'S DIFFERENT FROM WHAT YOU MIGHT SEE IN SAN FRANCISCO AS APPLIED TO A SHELTER, RIGHT? IT IS REALLY EASY FRANKLY TO EXIT SOMEBODY FROM A SHELTER FOR

BAD BEHAVIOR. THEY DON'T HAVE TENANT RIGHTS. IT IS MUCH MORE DIFFICULT TO EVICT SOMEBODY FROM PERM TENT MANY HOUSING. SO I DO WANT TO MAKE THAT DISTINCTION. IT IS ALSO MUCH MORE DAMMING TO SOMEONE, LIKE THEIR LIVELIHOOD AND THEIR ABILITY TO REMAIN SAFETY TO ACTUALLY EVICT THEM. YOU WOULDN'T NEED SOMETHING LIKE THIS IF THERE WERE STRONGER PARTNERSHIPS BETWEEN PROVIDERS, CITIES, AND COUNTIES. THEY WERE BETTER FUNDED TO DO THIS WORK, RIGHT? THE WORK ITSELF IS VERY CHALLENGING. A LOT OF THE LANGUAGE IN HERE, LIKE UNDER RESIDENTS, RULES, EXPECTATIONS. THAT'S JUST STANDARD STUFF THAT'S IN A LEASE, RIGHT? SO I DON'T HAVE ANY QUESTIONS WITH THAT BEING IN HERE. I DO THINK PATROLLING A SURROUNDING NEIGHBORHOOD, THERE IS NOT ENOUGH FUNDING IN PROJECTS TO DO THAT. 24/7 SECURITY. YOU KNOW, SECURITY'S \$45, \$55 AN HOUR. THERE'S NO FUNDING IN PROJECTS FOR SECURITY TO RUN 24/7. IT JUST DOESN'T EXIST. SUPER EASY TO HAVE SECURITY FILL IN. SUPER EASY TO HAVE A PROPERTY MANAGER DO PERIMETER CHECKS. NO PROBLEMS AT ALL. WHAT DOES THAT MEAN? I DON'T KNOW IF IT MEANS A BLOCK, THAT WILL MAKE A BIG DIFFERENCE. I WOULD SAY MOVING LITTER AND DEBRIS, MAYBE WITH THIS PROJECT SPECIFICALLY, IT'S RIGHT NEXT DOOR TO THE LIQUOR STORE. NOT EVERY PIECE OF DEBRIS THAT COMES FROM THE AERIAL LIKE THAT WILL LIVE ON THIS SITE. I WOULDN'T NECESSARILY BE RESPONSIBLE FOR CLEANING UP TRASH THAT BELONGS TO ANOTHER BUSINESS. I THINK IT'S A LITTLE ODD TO HAVE SOMETHING THEY WOULD CAUSE IT. THIS PROJECT IS PRETTY SMALL. IF THE CITY JUST CALLS ME AND SAID, HEY, IF YOU GET INTO SUPER BIG PROJECTS, WHICH SEBASTOPOL WON'T. YOU'RE A SMALL CITY. BUT THAT COULD BE CHALLENGING DOWN THE ROAD. AND I WOULD REQUEST ANY TIME YOU SAY 24 HOURS, 72 HOURS, 48 HOURS THAT YOU SAY BUSINESS HOURS BECAUSE SOMETIMES WE HAVE A THREE-DAY HOLIDAY WEEKENDS. THOSE ARE KIND OF MY NOTES ON THIS. BUT AGAIN, A LOT OF THIS WOULD BE RESOLVED WITH A STRONG PROVIDER THAT ACTUALLY DOES GOOD PROPERTY MANAGEMENT. EVICT PEOPLE WHEN THEY NEED TO BE EVICTED, KEEPS THE PROPERTY CLEAN, STAYS IN GOOD CONTACT WITH THE CITY. YOU KNOW, I DON'T WANT HOMELESSNESS TO BECOME A POLITICAL ISSUE. WE ARE JUST TALKING ABOUT VULNERABLE PEOPLE, AND MAKING SURE THEY HAVE SOMEWHERE TO LIVE, YOU KNOW, THAT'S SAFE.

GO AHEAD, COUNCILMEMBER CARTER. AND THEN I HAVE A QUESTION FOR YOU, ALEX.

YEAH. YOU'RE GETTING TO SOMETHING THAT I WAS THINKING ABOUT. IF THIS POLICY IS UNNECESSARY TO WHAT YOU ARE ALREADY DOING, WE JUST NEED THE GUARANTEES THAT SOME OF THE THINGS ARE HAPPENING THAT SOMEBODY IS GOING TO KEEP THE WATCH OUT, WALK AROUND, MAKE SURE THE PLACE IS CLEAN. YOU'RE A GOOD NEIGHBOR. AND YOU SEEM LIKE A VERY GOOD OPERATOR. WHAT KIND OF THINGS DOES THE CITY HAVE TO KNOW YOU'RE GOING TO BE DOING THESE?

YEAH, THAT'S A GREAT QUESTION. WE WANT TO BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR, RIGHT? IT'S NOT BENEFICIAL FOR ANYBODY TO BE A BAD NEIGHBOR. WE WANT TO BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR TO THE CITY, TO OUR ACTUAL NEIGHBORS, TO THE BUSINESSES. WE JUST WANT IT TO BE GOOD FOR EVERYBODY, RIGHT? SO WE DO HAVE ON-SITE STAFF ALL THE TIME. WE ARE ACCESSIBLE AND AVAILABLE. PRETTY MUCH ANY PROVIDER THAT'S USED TO WORKING WITH ME. THERE'S SEVERAL IN THIS ROOM. THEY KNOW IF THEY CALL ME AT 2:00 IN THE MORNING, I MIGHT NOT ANSWER THE FIRST TIME YOU CALL. BUT IF YOU CALL RIGHT BACK, I'M GOING TO ANSWER, RIGHT? I AM SOMEBODY WHO IS DEDICATED MY CAREER AND MY LIFE TO HELPING PEOPLE THAT ARE IN THIS SITUATION. AND I ALSO UNDERSTAND AND ACKNOWLEDGE THAT PROVIDERS LIKE COTS ARE NOT JUST HERE TO SERVE PEOPLE THAT COME TO US FOR HELP. WE ARE ALSO HERE TO SERVE THE COMMUNITY MORE BROADLY, RIGHT? COMMUNITIES ARE BETTER WHEN FEWER PEOPLE ARE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS. THEY ARE BETTER WHEN PEOPLE HAVE PLACES TO LIVE, AND WE WANT TO MAKE IT A GOOD EXPERIENCE. WHAT I CAN PROMISE THE CITY IS THAT COTS IS SUPER RESPONSIVE. THERE'S GOING TO BE ISSUES THAT COME UP. THERE ARE GOING TO BE THINGS THAT WILL COME UP. MY PROMISE TO YOU IS WE WILL WORK ALONGSIDE YOU AND REALLY QUICKLY TO RESOLVE AND ADDRESS THOSE ISSUES IN THE BEST WAY THAT WE CAN. WE WANT TO HAVE A GOOD FRIENDLY PARTNERSHIP WITH YOU. I DON'T WANT IT TO BE SOMETHING WHERE YOU'RE LIKE THIS WAS TERRIBLE. WE DON'T LIKE COTS, RIGHT? WE DON'T WANT THAT FOR ANYBODY. THAT I CAN PROMISE

YOU. I CERTAINLY CAN'T PROMISE YOU'RE NEVER GOING TO SEE A PIECE OF TRASH ON THE SIDEWALK OR WE'RE NEVER GOING TO HAVE A TENANT THAT CAUSES PROBLEMS. I THINK THAT'S TRUE FOR ANY MULTI-PROPERTY UNITS. YOU'LL HAVE TENANTS THAT ARE DIFFICULT, BUT WE'RE DO OUR ABSOLUTE BEST TO MAKE IT A GOOD EXPERIENCE FOR EVERYBODY.

OKAY, THANK YOU. GOOD COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN.

YES, A QUESTION TO ALEX. SO COULD WE JUST POSTPONE THIS? WHAT WOULD WE NEED TO DO TO POSTPONE THIS? BECAUSE I WOULD LIKE TO GIVE COTS WITH WHAT I UNDERSTAND AND THEIR TRACK RECORD, AND MY RELATIONSHIP WITH KRIS. A GO WITH THIS WITHOUT FEELING THERE'S UNNECESSARILY RESTRAINED. BUT ALSO I HEAR THE MAYOR, THE FACT SOME DON'T KNOW YOU AND IT IS TRUST, BUT VERIFIED. SO COULD WE JUST NOT CONTINUE THIS UNTIL WHEN IS THE OPEN DATE AGAIN, JANUARY? NOW WHAT ARE WE TALKING ABOUT? NOVEMBER. SO COULD WE NOT JUST CALENDAR THIS N I DON'T KNOW, WHENEVER MY COLLEAGUES WOULD LIKE TO RECALENDAR IT?

ABSOLUTELY. IT'S UP TO THE DISCRETION OF THE COUNCIL, AND IF YOU COULD TABLE THE ITEM OR JUST CONTINUE IT TO A SPECIFIC DATE IN THE FUTURE.

OKAY. ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU.

ALL RIGHT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH. THANK YOU ALL FOR ANSWERING THOSE QUESTIONS. ANY OTHER QUESTIONS HERE? I HAVE ONE. I MEAN AS WE WERE TALKING ABOUT THE GOOD NEIGHBORHOOD POLICIES AND WHO SAT IN THE ROOM WITH FOLKS WHO WERE RUNNING ELDERBERRY COMMENT, AND LISTENING TO THEM. TELLING THEM WE DON'T NEED SECURITY, WE DON'T NEED THIS, WE DON'T NEED THAT. BUT AT THE SAME TIME HEARING 25% OF OUR POLICE TIME HAS BEEN SPENT AT ELDERBERRY COMMONS, AND IT WAS MUCH HIGHER THAN THAT WHEN IT FIRST OPENED. THEY TOLD US EVERY SUPPORTIVE HOUSING PROJECT HAS A REAL INCREASE IN POLICE ACTIVITY IN THE FIRST SIX MONTHS. THEY TOLD US THAT. THE FOLKS WHO RUN THAT AND ALL THE PEOPLE WHO WERE INVOLVED IN THAT. I SAT THERE AND LISTENED TO THEM. I WANT TO KNOW, YOU KNOW, WHATEVER WE'RE DOING, I JUST WANT TO MAKE SURE WE'RE NOT BACK AT CITY HALL, LISTENING TO THE SAME STORY AGAIN. AND THEN WE'RE HAVING TO ANSWER TO OUR CONSTITUENTS ABOUT WHY, YOU KNOW, THE POLICE ARE SO BUSY. THEY CANNOT RESPOND TO OTHER PLACES BECAUSE SO MUCH TIME IS BEING SPENT IN OTHER FACILITIES THAT SAID THEY DIDN'T NEED ANY SECURITY OR ANYTHING LIKE THAT. I UNDERSTAND EVERYONE HAS GOOD INTENTIONS. BUT AT THE END OF THE DAY. THE FACTS ARE THE FACTS, AND WE'VE GONE THROUGH THIS OVER THE LAST FEW YEARS. SO AGAIN, I WOULD LIKE TO TRUST, BUT I NEED TO VERIFY BECAUSE I SPENT A GREAT DEAL OF TIME DEALING WITH THIS OVER THE LAST FEW YEARS. SO THERE WE ARE. SO THAT'S WHAT -- I DON'T KNOW, YOU'RE THE ONE THAT BROUGHT THIS FORWARD? WE'RE DUE TO GO TO PUBLIC COMMENT. IS THAT RIGHT?

YES. I WAS JUST GOING TO JUMP IN TO LET YOU KNOW WE NEED TO GO TO PUBLIC COMMENTS.

YEAH. YEAH. THANK YOU, YOU GUYS CAN GO AHEAD AND SIT DOWN. THANK YOU. SO THIS IS FOR PUBLIC COMMENT ON THE GOOD NEIGHBORHOOD POLICY PROPOSED. IF YOU'D LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT, AGAIN, IT'S TWO MEMBERS. WE GO TO CHAMBERS FIRST.

YEAH, I JUST WANT TO SAY, YOU KNOW, WE'VE HAD PRETTY SLICK PRESENTATIONS LIKE THAT BEFORE. WHO STOOD HERE VERY CONFIDENTLY TELLING EVERYBODY HOW GREAT IT WAS ALL GOING TO BE. SMOOTH. BUT IT HAS CHANGED ALL THE TIME. SO I HAVE A LOT OF CONFIDENCE IN WHAT IS BEING DISCUSS TODAY WITH THESE PEOPLE. BUT WHO KNOWS. THEY MIGHT NOT BE, SO THAT IS MY FIRST POINT. I GUESS MY OTHER BOY, THIS HAS WORKED PRETTY WELL IN SAN FRANCISCO. THEY HAD TO TIGHTEN UP THE GOOD NEIGHBOR POLICY WITH ALL THE DIFFERENT DEPARTMENTS. OBVIOUSLY SAN FRANCISCO IS A BIG COMPLICATED CITY. BUT SEBASTOPOL IS TINY. WE SHOULD BE ABLE TO EXECUTE THIS REALLY WELL. THIS IS VERY CONSISTENT WITH THE WAY GIVEN THE OPIOID EPIDEMIC AND SO ON. VERY CONSISTENT, BY THE WAY, CITIES HAVE BEEN HANDLING THESE KINDS OF CIVIC PROBLEMS, I GUESS YOU COULD CALL IT. THANK YOU. THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT, I'LL GO OUT TO ZOOM. THANK YOU.

GREAT, I WAS STRUCK BY A COMMENT OR ONE OF THE SPEAKERS THAT THERE IS NO REAL MONEY IN 24 SECURITY. AND I HOPE THESE FOLKS WILL UNDERSTAND IT. I THINK A LOT OF PEOPLE THINK A CITY LIKE SEBASTOPOL, JUST LOADED WITH BUCKS. WE'VE GOT POLICEMEN CRAWLING OUT OF THE WOODWORK. IF BE WE NEED A FEW MORE POLICE CALLS AT ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL OR AT SEBASTOPOL OR WHATEVER THOSE COMMONS IS, GRAVENSTEIN COMMONS. IT'S NOT A PROBLEM. IT IS A PROBLEM THOUGH. 25% OF OUR POLICE CALLS ARE NOW GOING TO ONE PLACE IF IT DOUBLES, AND WE HAVE 50% OF OUR POLICE CALLS GOING HERE. WE EITHER HAVE TO HIRE A COUPLE MORE POLICEMEN, WHICH IS VERY EXPENSIVE OR WE HAVE TO STOP PATROLLING. WE HAVE TO STOP DEALING, YOU KNOW, WITH PROBLEMS WITH THE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS. I MEAN, RESOURCES HAVE TO BE SHIFTED AWAY FROM THINGS. AND THAT'S ONE OF THE REASONS SOME OF US ARE REALLY UPSET ABOUT THAT. I HOPE THE SPEAKERS CAN UNDERSTAND THIS. THANK YOU.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT I'LL COME INTO CHAMBERS. IF ANYONE IN CHAMBERS WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A COMMENT ON THIS ITEM?

ME AGAIN. I'LL MAKE ONE MORE COMMENT. I KNOW I WAS HERE BEFORE, AND TENANTS AT ONE OTHER HOUSING UNIT HAD SAID IT WAS REALLY IMPORTANT TO THEM TO HAVE SOME KIND OF SECURITY. AND I UNDERSTAND THE FUNDING ISSUE WITH SECURITY. I AM HOPING A REALLY GOOD PROPERTY MANAGER WILL BE HIRED. SOMEONE WHO IS TRAUMA INFORMED. SOMEONE WHO IS WILLING TO GO OUT AT 2:00 IN THE MORNING AND DEAL WITH ISSUES THAT ARE COMING UP OR GETTING FENTANYL OFF THE PROPERTIES WHEN THEY SHOW UP. BECAUSE AT ONE OF OUR SITES, THAT'S NOT HAPPENING RIGHT NOW. A LOT OF THE TENANTS ARE CONCERNED ABOUT THAT. SO I, AGAIN, WANT TO SUPPORT YOU AND ENCOURAGE YOU AND THANK YOU FOR TAKING THIS ON. YEAH. THANKS.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. NEXT I'LL GO OUT TO ZOOM. ROB, CAN YOU UNMUTE YOURSELF, PLEASE?

HI, YEAH. I JUST HAVE TWO QUESTIONS ABOUT THIS. ONE IS HOW IS THIS PROGRAM BEING A GOOD NEIGHBOR TO THE LIQUOR STORE THAT'S NEXT DOOR? I THINK IT'S FUNNY THERE'S A LIQUOR STORE NEARBY ALL THESE PLACES. I'M SURE THEY GET INCREASED FOOT TRAFFIC, AND IT'S A PROBLEM THEY HAVE TO DEAL WITH. SO I'M WONDERING HOW DO WE, YOU KNOW, THEY'RE THE ONES THAT ARE GOING TO HAVE TO SAY NO IF THEY THINK SOMEONE SHOULDN'T HAVE IT. HOW DO WE SUPPORT THEM IN DOING THAT? AND THEN THE OTHER ONE IS JUST ABOUT THE -- I'M SORRY, NOT ABOUT THE FOOT TRAFFIC, BUT THE INCREASED PATROLS. I KEEP HEARING ABOUT A CITIZENS POLICE SOMETHING OR ANOTHER. NOT OFFICERS, BUT SOME KIND OF CITIZENS TRAINING. AND YOU KNOW, THEY KEEP GETTING SHELLED FOR A LOT OF REASONS. BUT WOULD THAT BE APPLICABLE FOR SOMETHING LIKE THIS? THANK YOU.

THANK YOU FOR YOUR PUBLIC COMMENT. IF ANYONE IN CHAMBERS WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT? SEEING NONE. I'LL GO BACK OUT TO ZOOM. IF ANYONE ON ZOOM WOULD LIKE TO MAKE A PUBLIC COMMENT ON THIS ITEM TO PLEASE RAISE YOUR HAND VIRTUALLY. SEEING NONE, THERE IS NO FURTHER PUBLIC COMMENT, MAYOR.

THANK YOU. PARDON PAR VERYVERY MUCH. OH, VICE MAYOR MAURER?

I WANT TO THANK COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN FOR SUGGESTING WE POSTPONE THIS ISSUE. I AGREE WITH THAT. I'M GOOD WITH TABLING IT. AND I THINK THAT IF WE WANT ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL TO ACTUALLY SIGN ON AND NOT HAVE IT JUST BE A POLICY THAT NOBODY SIGNS ON TO. WE SHOULDN'T MAKE EDITS AND WORK WITH THEM, AND THEY COULD WORK WITH COTS TO MAKE EDITS THAT MAKES SENSE. BECAUSE WE WANT THEIR BUY IN TO IT IF WE'RE GOING TO PASS IT. SO MY HOPE IS IN THE MEANTIME BETWEEN NOW AND WHENEVER WE BRING IT BACK THAT WE CAN HAVE THAT COLLABORATION. THANK YOU.

WELL, THANK YOU, VICE MAYOR. YEAH, IF THAT'S THE MOTION. I'LL SECOND IT.

THANK YOU.

CAN I JUST CLARIFY? I HEARD TWO DIFFERENT THINGS. WOULD YOU LIKE IT TO COME BACK AT A FUTURE DATE? I THINK COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN HAD MENTIONED NOVEMBER OR JANUARY? OR DO YOU WANT TO TABLE IT?

NO. BRING IT BACK. BUT MEANWHILE COLLABORATE WITH ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL AND COTS ON THE LANGUAGE. AND MAKE SURE WHATEVER IT IS THEY'RE WILLING TO SIGN ONTO IT.

IS THAT DIRECTING CITY STAFF TO DO THAT OR OUR LIAISON WHO IS COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN AND STAFF? I JUST WANT TO CLARIFY, SO WE ARE ALL ON THE SAME PAGE.

WE COULD JUST PICK A DATE, AND THEN THAT WAY WE ALL KNOW WHAT WE'RE STRIVING TOWARDS. HOPEFULLY, YES, OUR TWO PARTNERS, ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL AND COTS CAN START LOOKING AT THE LANGUAGE AND SUGGESTING THE LANGUAGE TO OUR CITY ATTORNEY FOR WHEN WE BRING IT BACK. SO IT'S A SITE YOU DO A GENDER REVIEW WITH THE GENDER REVIEW PEOPLE. WHAT DATE DO YOU THINK WOULD BE GOOD? I WOULD ACTUALLY LIKE A ROUGH DATE ON DECEMBER OR JANUARY OR SOMETHING. I'LL DEFER TO YOU.

SO NOW I'M HEARING TWO DAYS. I'M NOW HEARING JANUARY, FEBRUARY TIME FRAME. JANUARY.

JANUARY?

THAT WOULD GIVE EVERYBODY A COUPLE OF MONTHS TO SEE WHAT IT LOOKS LIKE.

OKAY. I'M SEEING THUMBS UP IN THE AUDIENCE, SO JANUARY THEN.

OKAY, THANK YOU. SO MOVED BY VICE MAYOR MAURER.

OH WAIT. UNDERSTAND COHINTON HAS HER HAND UP.

I'M SORRY.

I WAS JUST GOING TO MAKE COMMENT. I MEAN, I -- I'M PROBABLY NOT GOING TO BE SUPPORTING THIS TONIGHT TO COME BACK. I'M JUST NOT SURE AT THIS POINT IT'S NECESSARY. SO I JUST WANT TO MAKE THAT COMMENT.

COUNCILMEMBER CARTER HAS HIS HAND UP AS WELL?

YEAH, I'M LEANING THAT WAY A LITTLE BIT TOO. WHEN THE PROBLEM REEMERGES.

WE HAVE A MOTION ON THE STABLE. I'M IN SUPPORT OF BRINGING IT BACK. IF WE'RE ALL GOING TO WEIGH IN HERE BEFORE WE ACTUALLY TAKE A VOTE.

SO BECAUSE THERE'S TWO COUNCIL MEMBERS WHO ARE NOT IN SUPPORT OF MOVING THIS FORWARD AND ARE WILLING TO TABLE IT. I AM GOING TO WITHDRAW MY MOTION.

OKAY. I'LL GO AHEAD AND MAKE THE MOTION, AND WE'LL SEE WHERE IT GOES TO BRING IT BACK IN JANUARY, AND FOR OUR TWO PROVIDERS, PARTNER PROVIDERS TO REVIEW IT, SUGGEST COMMENTS, AND BRING IT BACK AT A DATE IN JANUARY EITHER THE FIRST OR SECOND MEETING OF JANUARY. SO THAT'S THE MOTION.

THANK YOU. SO MOVED BY COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN AND SECONDED BY MAYOR MCLEWIS TO CONTINUE THIS ITEM TO EITHER THE FIRST OR THIRD MEETING IT IN JANUARY 2027, AND ALLOWING OUR PARTNER PROVIDERS TO REVIEW AND PROVIDE EDITS TO THE CITY. COUNCILMEMBER CARTER?

NO.

COUNCILMEMBER HINTON?

NO.

COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN?

YES.

VICE MAYOR MAURER?

NO.

MAYOR MCLEWIS?

YES.

THE MOTION FAILS WITH COUNCILMEMBER ZOLLMAN AND MAYOR MCLEWIS IN SUPPORT, AND COUNCILMEMBERS CARTER, HINTON, AND VICE MAYOR MAURER IN OPPOSITION.

OKAY, MOVING ON TO ITEM NUMBER TEN --

ACTUALLY, CARTER HAS HIS HAND UP.

YEAH, I'M JUST CURIOUS. DOES THAT AUTOMATICALLY TABLE THE ITEM OR WHAT HAPPENS?

UNLESS THERE'S A FURTHER MOTION TONIGHT, THE ITEM IS DEAD.

OH, OKAY.

SO SOMEONE COULD MAKE A MOTION TO TABLE IT AND BRING IT BACK AT A LATER DATE, IF NECESSARY.

NO?

NO. THAT WAS WHAT WAS JUST -- GO AHEAD, ALEX.

SO THAT WAS THE MOTION TO BRING IT BACK IN THE FUTURE. YOU COULD ALWAYS IN THE FUTURE HAVE A FUTURE AGENDA ITEM TO BRING THIS BACK IF CIRCUMSTANCES CHANGE.

I JUST WANTED TO CLARIFY WHY I WITHDREW MY MOTION. THAT'S BECAUSE THERE WERE TWO MEMBERS THAT WERE NOT IN SUPPORT, AND BECAUSE I KNOW THAT IT WOULD TAKE STAFF TIME AND COTS TIME AND ST. VINCENTS DE PAUL TIMES TO DO ALL THAT WORK. THAT'S WHY I WITHDREW MY MOTION.

ALL RIGHT. SO ITEM NUMBER 10, PRESENTATION FROM HEART/SOUL, SOLVING OBSTACLES FOR UNSHELTERED LIVES AND WEST COUNTY COMMUNITY SERVICES ON SERVICES PROVIDED FOR HOMELESS SERVICES AND CONSIDERATION OF CONTRACTS FOR HOMELESS OUTREACH SERVICES. THE MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING, MOU OF UNDERSTANDING WITH HEART EXPIRES SEPTEMBER 16, 2026, AND THE CONTRACT WITH WCCS EXPIRED JUNE 30, 2026. THE ITEM TONIGHT IS TO CONSIDER AGREEMENTS WITH THE FOLLOWING. A, DRAFT A CONTRACT WITH SOUL. THIS ITEM WILL BE RETURNED TO A FUTURE CITY COUNCIL MEETING FOR APPROVAL. DRAFT MOU IS ATTACHED TO THE AGENDA. HEART WILL CONTINUE TO PERFORM SERVICES UNTIL SUCH TIME THAT THE CONTRACT IS RETURNED FOR FORMAL APPROVAL AND/OR ADOPTION. TENTATIVELY SEPTEMBER 15. B, APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION/CONTRACT WITH WCCS, OR C, OTHER DIRECTION TO STAFF. I'M GOING TO TURN THIS OVER TO OUR POLICE CHIEF. IS HE IN THE ROOM?

HE IS.

PERFECT. HI.

HELLO. SO I THINK YOU PRETTY MUCH SUMMED IT UP, MAYOR MCLEWIS, THAT WE'VE GOT A PRESENTATION TONIGHT FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES AND WEST COUNTY COMMUNITY SERVICES, REGARDING THE HOMELESS OUTREACH SERVICES. SO I'LL TURN IT OVER TO HUNTER TO KICK IT OFF. NO? CHRISTY?

OKAY. DO WE HAVE THE POWERPOINT SLIDES? IS THAT SOMETHING WE'RE GOING TO SHARE?

MAY I ASK A QUESTION. DO WE HAVE MULTIPLE PRESENTATIONS HERE, CHIEF? HOW ARE WE?

ONE FROM WEST COUNTY COMMUNITY SERVICES AND ONE FROM SONOMA COUNTY, DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES.

OKAY, I JUST WANT TO MAKE SURE SINCE YOU SWITCHED AROUND.

DID YOU SUBMIT THE SLIDES? I KNOW WE HAVE THE PRESENTATION IN THE REPORT, THE PRESENTATION IS IN THE REPORT ITSELF.

IT COULD BE A COMBINED PRESENTATION. IS THAT RIGHT?

YEAH. IT'S FINE IF WE DON'T. OKAY. WE WERE GOING TO SHARE JUST THE HISTORY OF THE SERVICES IN SEBASTOPOL OVER THE PAST FIVE YEARS, AND HOW THE SERVICES WITH WEST COUNTY COMMUNITY SERVICES TO PROVIDE OUTREACH IN SEBASTOPOL REALLY A ROSE FROM THE NEED THAT THE COMMUNITY HAD ON THE TRAIL. AND THEN ALSO THE PARKING ON MORRIS STREET AND THE NEIGHBORHOOD OF SEBASTOPOL. THE CITY WAS LOOKING FOR A RESPONSE, AND CONTRACTED FOR A FULL-TIME OUTREACH PERSON IN THE FIRST YEAR WITH US. THEN IN THE FOUR YEARS FOLLOWING, WE CONTINUE TO PROVIDE SERVICES, ALTHOUGH THE SHIFT OF FOCUS CHANGED AS THE COMMUNITY NEEDS CHANGED. AND FUNDING WAS REDUCED TO PART TIME, AND WE APPLIED FOR ADDITIONAL FUNDING TO CONTINUE FULL-TIME SUPPORT HERE. OUR CONTRACT DID END AT THE END OF JUNE. THE SECOND SLIDE WAS LOOKING AT, OH, THERE WE ARE. LOOKING AT THE DATA POINTS OVER THE FIVE YEARS. AND THE FIRST HIGHLIGHT OF THE DATA BECAUSE THE SERVICES, THE FOCUS SHIFTED BASED ON THE NEEDS. YOU KNOW, WE WERE REALLY CAPTURING UNIQUE INDIVIDUALS THAT WE WERE CONNECTING WITH. BUT THE DATA CHANGED. WHAT WE WERE REPORTING CHANGED AS OUR SERVICES CHANGED. SO THAT WAS SOMETHING I JUST WANTED TO CALL ATTENTION TO IN THAT SLIDE. THE BIGGER POINT THAT I NEED TO ADDRESS. THE 25/26 REPORTING. AND REALLY JUST ACKNOWLEDGE WHAT HAPPENED IN OUR REPORTING LAST YEAR. IN SPRING, I WAS LOOKING AT THE REPORT, AND WE WERE REPORTING ON HOW MANY INDIVIDUALS WERE ACTIVE IN COORDINATED ENTRY EACH MONTH. AND THE YEAR-TO-DATE TOTAL REALLY CAUGHT MY ATTENTION BECAUSE IT WAS PRETTY BIG. SO I

STARTED LOOKING INTO IT, AND IT WAS REALLY A RESULT OF TWO THINGS OF ERROR AND MY SPREAD SHEET THAT WE WEREN'T GOING TO REPORT ON THE YEAR-TO-DATE TOTALS BECAUSE PEOPLE ARE ENROLLED IN COORDINATED ENTRY. THEY MAINTAINED STATUS, AND SOME PEOPLE WERE EXITED. SO REALLY THE MONTHLY COUNT IS THE NUMBER WE'RE REPORTING. THERE ISN'T A YEAR TO DATE OF ACTIVE PEOPLE. THE SECOND FACTOR WAS OUR STAFF HAS BEEN OVERREPORTING. I WAS HAVING REPORTS PULLED, AND I WAS LOOKING DEEPLY INTO THAT TO CORRECT THAT ERROR. I CONTACTED THE CITY. I RESUBMITTED REPORTS. AND THEN, YOU KNOW, THERE WAS ONE OTHER DATA POINT THAT SOME QUESTION. I WAS ASKING QUESTIONS MYSELF TO GET DOWN TO THE BOTTOM OF THINGS. AND IT WAS FOR THE PEOPLE THAT MOVED INTO PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING. UNFORTUNATELY THE STAFF THAT WE HAD UNFORTUNATELY BECAUSE I CAN'T GET ANSWERS FROM THEM ANYMORE. WHAT I DID DISCOVER IS OUR OUTREACH WAS USING THE COUNTY TRACKING SYSTEM, THE HMIS, BUT ALSO KEEPING THEIR OWN INFORMAL LOG OF CONTACTS THEY WERE MAKING, SERVICES THEY WERE PROVIDING THAT WEREN'T BEING RECOGNIZED IN EACH HMIS. AND I HEARD JILL SAY EARLIER, TRUST, BUT VERIFY. THE VERIFICATION WASN'T HAPPENING WITH THE DIRECT SUPERVISION. AND SO REALLY, AT THIS POINT, I PROVIDED THE NUMBERS FOR 25/26 BECAUSE THOSE WERE THE NUMBERS THAT WERE REPORTED. I WANTED TO ADDRESS IT TONIGHT. AND SOME OF THE NUMBERS, I DON'T HAVE THE ANSWER TO. TO BE EQUALLY FAIR UNFORTUNATELY. I MEAN, THAT'S REALLY DISAPPOINTING FOR ME. WE KNOW THE SERVICES WERE BEING PROVIDED, AND THEY WEREN'T REPORTED CORRECTLY. I DON'T THINK IT WAS INTENTIONAL, MISREPRESENTATION. I THINK THERE WAS A LOT OF OVERSIGHT, AND A LACK OF UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT THE NUMBERS MEANT, LIKE WHAT WE WERE TRYING TO CAPTURE IN THIS REPORT. AND I WILL TAKE RESPONSIBILITY THAT IT IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY TO TIGHTEN UP THE COMPLIANCE OF REPORTING TO HAVE THE OVERSIGHT, AND TO HAVE CLEAR DEFINITION OF WHAT THEY'RE COUNTING AND WHY THEY'RE COUNTING IT. SO I JUST -- I HAVE TO TAKE RESPONSIBILITY AND OWNERSHIP OF THIS, AND UNFORTUNATELY I JUST DON'T HAVE THE ACCURATE NUMBER FOR HOW MANY PEOPLE DID MOVE INTO PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING. THE LAST SLIDE, SUCH A JARRING TRANSITION. IT'S AN ACTUAL SUCCESS STORY OF A COUPLE THAT WE DID PROVIDE SERVICE. AND I THINK THE SUCCESS STORY REALLY JUST HIGHLIGHTS THE LONG GAME OF OUTREACH THAT IT REALLY TAKES TIME TO BUILD RELATIONSHIPS, TO HELP THEM START GETTING ENGAGED WITH RECEIVING SERVICES. TO GET THE DOCUMENTS READY. TO HELP THEM BE PREPARED TO MOVE INTO HOUSING. AND FOR THIS COUPLE, IT TOOK A COUPLE OF YEARS, AND THEY ARE NOW MOVING INTO GEORGE'S PLACE THAT HAS OPENED IN GUERNEVILLE JUST LAST MONTH. YEAH. SO I AM NOT SURE HOW THIS STRUCTURE IS, IF YOU WANT ME TO STAY HERE FOR QUESTIONS FOR THIS PART? MOVE TO HUNTER, THEN COME BACK TO QUESTIONS?

I THINK WE WANT TO GO TO HUNTER TO DO HIS PRESENTATION, AND THEN WE CAN COME BACK TO QUESTIONS FROM THE COUNCIL.

HI, Y'ALL. HUNTER SCOTT. YOU RECENTLY KNEW ME FROM WHEN I WORKED FOR HOME FIRST, HAVE MY PARTNERS HERE. I NOW WORK FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH SERVICES. I'M THE DEPUTY DIRECTOR FOR HOMELESSNESS SERVICES. SO IT'S GOOD TO BE HERE IN THIS NEW CAPACITY. RECOGNIZING THESE PRESENTATIONS ARE TO BE TEN MINUTES. I'M GOING TO SPEED THROUGH THIS. BUT THERE WILL BE TIME FOR QUESTIONS OBVIOUSLY. SO ABOUT IN DECEMBER OF LAST YEAR, WE STARTED A REALLY WONDERFUL NEW OUTREACH PILOT WITH THE CITY OF SEBASTOPOL AND THE POLICE DEPARTMENT WITH A GOAL OF MEETING PEOPLE WHERE THEY ARE, PAIRING OUTREACH WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT RESPONSE, AND MORE ACCURATELY TO REALLY REPLACE OUTREACH WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT RESPONSE, WHERE THAT IS APPROPRIATE. AND CREATE PATHWAYS TO SERVICES WAS THE GOAL OF INCREASING COORDINATION AROUND HOMELESSNESS, AND HELPING PEOPLE MOVE FROM CONTACTS TO MEANINGFUL SERVICE. NEXT SLIDE. SO SOME OF THE DATA WE ACHIEVED TO DATE, AND WE HAVE WONDERFUL STAFF NAMED JULIAN WHO HAS TAKEN THIS ROLE ON IN THE CITY. HE'S ENGAGED 67 PEOPLE, 30 OF THOSE ARE ACTIVE COORDINATED ENTRIES, MADE 12 SHELTER PLACEMENTS, AND MOVED THREE FOLKS INTO HOUSING. IT DOES TAKE TIME

TO BUILD RELATIONSHIP WITH FOLKS. SO WE EXPECT THOSE NUMBERS TO INCREASE PER TIME PERIOD IF THAT MAKES SENSE AS THIS PROJECT DEPOSE ON. NEXT SLIDE?

CAN I ASK YOU A QUICK QUESTION?

YES.

67 PEOPLE ENGAGED. IS THAT WITHIN THE SEBASTOPOL CITY LIMITS OR IS THAT OUTSIDE OF SEBASTOPOL?

SEBASTOPOL. WELL, HE'S PROBABLY GOING A LITTLE BIT OUTSIDE. YOU KNOW, HE'S NOT DOING THE ENTIRE TRAIL, BUT PROBABLY GOING A LITTLE BIT DOWN THE TRAIL BECAUSE PEOPLE DO MOVE IN AND OUT. BUT HIS FOCUS HAS BEEN SEBASTOPOL.

THOSE ARE 67 DIFFERENT PEOPLE?

CORRECT.

SO I THINK ONE OF THE BIG LEARNINGS AFTER WHEREVER WE ARE. EIGHT MONTHS OF DOING THIS IS WE HAVE A PARTNER ORGANIZATION THAT YOU ARE ALL FUNDING, AND WE REALLY NEED TO ENGAGE CLOSER TOGETHER TO MAKE SURE WE ARE NOT DUPLICATING SERVICES, BUT ALSO ENHANCING EACH OTHERS SERVICES. WE ALSO FUND WCCS TO DO OUTREACH

IN GUERNEVILLE.

AND IT WILL REALLY GUIDE ALL OF

OUR INTERACTIONS.

AND THAT'S GOING TO DO THINGS LIKE

HAVING OUR STAFF CHECK IN

EVERY

EVERY TO COORDINATE THE DAY AND DOING COOUTREACH

TOGETHER.

MAKE REFERRALS TO THOSE
PROGRAMS
FOR OUR CASES WHERE THEY THINK,

HEY,
THIS ISN'T SOMETHING WHERE
WE WANT TO -- MAYBE IT'S NOT

ILLEGAL CONDUCT, NECESSARILY,

BUT THE POLICE DEPARTMENT THINKS
IT WOULD BENEFIT FROM
GOING
THROUGH SOME OF THIS PROCESS AND

THEY MAY SUGGEST OR REFER
PEOPLE
TO IT, OR IT MAY BE A TYPE OF

LOW LEVEL CRIME WHERE THE POLICE
DEPARTMENT DETERMINES IT'S

NOT
APPROPRIATE TO DO A
CRIMINAL
PROCESS WHERE A CITATION
IS
ISSUED OR AN ARREST IS MADE.

BUT THE MOST COMMON WAY
THIS
WORKS IS THOSE REFERRALS ARE

MADE, MIGHT COME FROM THE
POLICE
DEPARTMENT, MIGHT COME
FROM

SOMEONE ELSE.
THE RESTORATIVE
JUSTICE PROGRAM
GOES ON, AND THE POLICE

DEPARTMENT IS NOT
INVOLVED
ANYMORE.

IT HAPPENS THERE.

IF IT'S NOT
SUCCESSFUL, POLICE
DEPARTMENT DOESN'T KNOW
ABOUT

IT.
IT'S NOT SOMETHING THEY FELT

WARRANTED, YOU KNOW,
CRIMINAL
CITATION TO BEGIN WITH.

IT'S ONE OF THE MOST COMMON

TYPES OF
PROGRAMS RUN BY CITIES.
THERE ARE PROGRAMS RUN BY
CITIES
WHERE A POLICE -- NOT RUN BY

CITIES BUT PARTNERED WITH

CITIES, WHERE POLICE DEPARTMENT

MIGHT ISSUE A CRIMINAL CITATION

TO SOMEONE.

RATHER THAN IT BE SENT TO
THE
JUVENILE JUSTICE SYSTEM, THAT

PERSON IS REFERRED TO
A
RESTORATIVE JUSTICE
PROGRAM
WHICH REPORTS BACK TO THE
POLICE
DEPARTMENT.

AND IF THE PROCESS IS

SUCCESSFUL, YOU KNOW,
THAT'S
SORT OF END OF THE LINE.

IF A PROCESS IS UNSUCCESSFUL FOR

WHATEVER REASON, THE POLICE
DEPARTMENT MAY THEN DECIDE TO
MOVE
FORWARD WITH
REFERRING THE
CITATION TO THE
PROBATION
DEPARTMENT AND JUVENILE
JUST
SYSTEM.

SO AT TIMES IN THE
PAST, YOU

KNOW, SEBASTOPOL AT ONE POINT
HAD GRANT FUNDING
AND
PARTICIPATED IN A PROGRAM
LIKE
THIS.

THAT FUNDING HAS EXPIRED.

IT HASN'T BEEN USED IN A COUPLE

YEARS.

I DO WANT TO NOTE, THOUGH, THIS

PROCESS INVOLVES A
CITATION
BEING ISSUED BY THE POLICE

DEPARTMENT.

AND SO WHILE THEY
AREN'TAREN'T
AND PART OF
THE
COUNTY SYSTEM, THERE IS A

CASE
REPORT ON THEM IN THE JUVENILES

IN THE CITY'S RECORDKEEPING AND
CITY'S POLICE RECORDS.

AND SO JUVENILE RECORDS ARE
CONFIDENTIAL, BUT IN RESPONSE TO
A LAWFUL SUBPOENA OR COURT ORDER
OR LAWFUL JUDICIAL WARRANT LIKE
THOSE -- THOSE RECORDS WOULD
BE
RELEASED.

THEY EXIST AND WOULD BE
RELEASED.

AND SO I'LL PAUSE THERE.

I THINK THAT SORT OF
SUMMARIZES MOST
OF THE -- THE SORT OF BROAD

OPTIONS.
AND I THINK THE
DISTINCTION
HAVING HEARD SOME QUESTIONS FROM

COUNCIL MEMBER ZOLLMAN, YOU
KNOW, THERE WAS A CONCERN

SPECIFICALLY
ABOUT
FINGERPRINTING.

AND THAT WOULD NOT
HAPPEN
THROUGH A CITATION UNLESS
A
CITATION WAS REFERRED TO THE

COUNTY.
HOWEVER, JUST TO REITERATE

AGAIN, IF A CITATION IS
ISSUED,
WHICH IS REALLY
NECESSARY IF THE
POLICE DEPARTMENT IS GOING TO

MONITOR COMPLIANCE WITH THE
RESTORATIVE JUSTICE PROCESS AND
POTENTIALLY REFER IT
TO
PROBATION AT
A LATER POINT.
A CITATION REALLY DOES NEED
TO
BE ISSUED UP FRONT.

AND WHILE NO
FINGERPRINTING
OCCURS, THAT DOES CREATE A LOCAL

CITATION RECORD IN THE
POLICE
RECORDKEEPING SYSTEM.

WITH THAT I'LL PAUSE AND SEE
IF
THERE ARE ANY QUESTIONS FROM

COUNCIL.

THANK YOU.

AND COUNCIL MEMBER
ZOLLMAN.

THANK YOU, ALEX, FOR
THE
REPORT.

YES, THE FINGERPRINTING
IS OF
HIGH CONCERN, AND I'D LIKE
YOU
TO BE ABLE TO EXPLAIN TO
THE
PUBLIC ALONG WITH THE CHIEF
THE

CONSEQUENCES OF FINGERPRINTING.
BECAUSE WHAT I HEARD THE CHIEF

SAY BEFORE HE SEEMED EXCITED
AND
PROUD OF HIS ARREST RECORD.

I'D LIKE TO KNOW
THE
CONSEQUENCES TO OUR YOUTH IF
WE
DO GO WITH A PROCESS THAT

INVOLVES FINGERPRINTING.
WHAT ARE THE CONSEQUENCES FOR

JUVENILES ONCE FINGERPRINTS
ARE
TAKEN BY A POLICE AUTHORITY?

HOW LONG ARE THEY KEPT ON FILE?

WHO HAS ACCESS TO THAT,
MEANING
HIGHER GOVERNMENTAL
AGENCIES,
THE FBI, ET CETERA?

AND PARTICULARLY FOR A BROWN

COMMUNITY WHAT ARE
THE

AN

ADULT AND TRANSFERRED TO
THE
SHERIFF'S OFFICE JAIL, THEY'D
BE
FINGERPRINTED AT THE
SHERIFF'S

OFFICE.
IN THE CASE OF JUVENILE

PROBATION, POSSIBLY THROUGH
THAT
PROCESS.

I DON'T KNOW AT WHAT
POINT
THROUGH THAT PROCESS BECAUSE
WE
DON'T HAVE ANY INVOLVEMENT IN

THAT.

COUNCIL MEMBER HINTON.

I'M SURPRISED TO BE HEARING

ABOUT FINGERPRINTS FOR
YOUTH
BECAUSE I UNDERSTOOD THAT YOU

COULDN'T ROUTINELY
TAKE
FINGERPRINTS FOR YOUTH.

AM I
NOT UNDERSTANDING THAT
CORRECT?

I'M GLAD WE DON'T DO IT IN

SEBASTOPOL, BUT I
THOUGHT THAT
THAT WASN'T
ALLOWED.

WE HAVE NO INVOLVEMENT IN
THE
PROCESS, SO I WOULDN'T WANT TO

COMMENT ON IT.

OKAY.

COUNCIL MEMBER
CARTER.

YEAH, JUST SHIFTING BACK TO

SAFEWAY IS THAT
NECESSARILY
TARGETED?

ANYWAY, YOU'RE MENTIONING
WE
MIGHT BE ABLE TO HAVE
AN
ORDINANCE THAT KIND
OF AFFECTS
THE WAY SAFEWAY MONITORS
WHAT
HAPPENS AROUND
ITS PROPERTY.

WE COULD ADOPT A
GRAFFITI
ABATEMENT ORDINANCE
THAT
REQUIRES PROPERTY OWNERS,
NOT
JUST
SAFEWAY.

CORRECT.

BUT OTHER COMMERCIAL
PROPERTY
OWNERS TO REMOVE GRAFFITI WITHIN

SPECIFIED PERIODS OF TIME
OR
FACE FINES OR THE RISK OF THE

CITY REMOVING IT AND
CHARGING
THEM FOR THAT.

RIGHT.

DO WE HAVE
ANYTHING ANYWHERE
NEAR
CLOSE TO THAT ALREADY,
WHERE THEY MUST
MAINTAIN, YOU
KNOW, THE PROPERTY
NICELY?

NO.

NOT SOMETHING THAT IS CLEAR AND

EXPLICIT.

OKAY.

AND HAVE WE DISCUSSED WITH
THEM
ABOUT THE SHAPE OF THE BACK
OF
THE BUILDING?

LIKE, YOU KNOW, MAINTAINING
A
LESS HABITABLE SPACE?

BECAUSE IT SEEMS TO
BE, YOU
KNOW, NICE.

OR IS THIS TOO DIRECTED MORE A
SPECIFIC PLACE?

IS THAT NOT
APPROPRIATE?

THAT'S A FINE QUESTION.

I DON'T KNOW, MAYOR, IF YOU
KNOW
THAT'S COME UP IN
THE

CONVERSATION.

SO FOR THE COUPLE TIMES THAT
WE DID MEET WITH SAFEWAY WE
DID
DISCUSS AREAS BACK THERE,
AND
THEY HAVE STATED THEY COULD NOT

THEM
MULTIPLE TIMES ABOUT A
VARIETY
OF ISSUES, THAT BEING ONE OF

THEM.
AND THEY WERE VERY RECEPTIVE TO

HAVING AN EXTENDED PATROL
OF
THEIR OWN FACILITY,
WHICH I
DON'T THINK THEY WERE DOING

BEFORE THAT, WHERE THEY'D
WALK
AROUND THE ENTIRE PREMISES
IN
THE MORN [JUST SORT OF SEE WHAT

THE STATUS OF THINGS WERE.

AND THEY COMMITTED TO ATTEMPTING
TO REMOVE THE GRAFFITI WITHIN
24HOURS
ON THEIR OWN, WHICH I

THOUGHT WAS COMMENDABLE.

AND TO MY KNOWLEDGE THEY'VE
BEEN
DOING THAT.

ALEX, EARLIER IN
YOUR
PRESENTATION YOU SAID THAT
THE
CITY HAS BEEN MEETING WITH

A
COUNCIL MEMBER, WITH
SAFEWAY,
WITH NEIGHBORS, SCHOOL, AND THE
POLICE DEPARTMENT AND SOME

STAFF.
AND I JUST WANT TO
DOUBLE-CHECK
WERE THE NEIGHBORS INCLUDED IN

ANY OF THOSE
MEETINGS?

SO THE FIRST THREE
MEETINGS
WAS WITH THE CITY'S -- THE

CHIEF, MYSELF, THE MAYOR AND
SAFEWAY AND ANALEE, I BELIEVE
